BIENNIAL REPORT AND FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Presented to delegates of affiliated Associations at the Ninth Biennial Conference of the Union, held at Perth on Friday, 26th February, 1954.

LADIES:

From our President,

It is a great disappointment to me that I am unable to be present at the Ninth Biennial Conference of the Union, and I would ask all members of the Executive and Delegates to accept my sincere apologies for my non-attendance.

Since the last Conference our athletics have brought even greater credit to Australia by performing with distinction at the Olympic Games in Helsinki. My warmest congratulations to our four representatives and thanks to Miss Gwen Bull for the capable way she managed the women's section of the team.

That the standard of women's athletics has steadily improved is in no small measure due to the help and encouragement given by members of the various State Councils and to the time devoted to the sport by those women officials who are responsible for organising and conducting inter-club competition and State Championships.

It is pleasing to know that all States will again be represented at these Australian Championships.

I cannot let this opportunity pass without expressing my thanks and appreciation to Mrs. Magee for her duties in connection with the Union. We are indeed fortunate to have a secretary who works as ably and willingly as she does in the truly voluntary spirit to foster women's athletics not only in Australia but on an international plane.

Our thanks are due also to the members of the Executive who have so capably assisted in carrying out the business of the Union in the period between Conferences.

My special greeting to the hostess State with every good wish for what I know will be an important and memorable occasion in the annals of women's athletics.

Your Executive has pleasure in submitting its Eighth Biennial Report and Financial Statement for your consideration.

The Union has continued to progress, and it is now difficult to imagine that our general standard of athletics could possibly reach a higher peak when compared with the standards of other countries - it is hoped we continue to improve.

In the track events at the 1952 Olympic Games held at Helsinki, the women athletes were outstanding in their successes in every event in which they entered, with the exception of the now world-renowned relay event, in which they followed similar occurrences by other countries in the past, an error which can and must be avoided in the future.

Miss Marjorie Jackson and Mrs. Shirley de la Hunty in particular have proved themselves not only the world's best, but the best of all times. This was the first occasion in which the world's sprints and hurdles championships titles have been held by Australians - either men or women.

TRAVELLING.

Air travel is the ideal mode of transport and on this occasion the team was able to resume training four days after leaving Australia.

Although very tired on arrival in London on the Tuesday night, the girls very quickly recovered and commenced training on the following day.

LONDON.

TRAINING.

The athletes trained at Motspur Park, an excellent ground with a fast cinders track. Hurdles were available for Miss Strickland and Miss Johnston was able to use the Broad Jump pit.

ILLNESSES.

During the month in London Marjorie Jackson was the only member to suffer any serious illness. In this connection it was necessary for her to visit the Charing Cross Hospital on three occasions. This trouble occurred during the last week in London and before leaving for Helsinki the Doctor gave Marjorie a thorough examination and considered she would have no further trouble with her side.

I would like to record my thanks to the Doctor and Nurses at the Charing Cross Hospital for their attention and interest in Marjorie.

ATHLETIC MEETINGS.

On Monday morning, the 23rd June the members of the athletic team left for Belfast and Northern Ireland where, as guests of the Royal Ulster Constabulary several enjoyable days were spent in sightseeing and athletic competitions. A State Banquet given by the Government of Northern Ireland, morning tea at Government House, and a tour of the Antrim coast to Giants Causeway and back to the airport prior to departure were amongst the social highlights. Two meetings at Ravenhill showed that the form of the women was encouraging. Marjorie Jackson's 100 yards 10.5 Sec. and 220 yards 24.8 Sec, Shirley Strickland's 80 metre hurdles 12 Sec. and the relay team 4 x 100 yards in 48.2 Sec. were all Northern Ireland records.

After a short flight to Glasgow the team landed late in the evening and were met at St. Enoch's Station air terminal. On the Friday the team trained at the University Ground and afterwards were the guests of the Glasgow Police on a tour to Loch Lomond for lunch at Luss and back along the Clyde.

The Glasgow Police had arranged a meeting at Ibrox Park on the Saturday afternoon. The ground was far from first class, the best performances being Marjorie Jackson's 100 yards in 10.5 Sec. and Shirley Strickland's 11.3 Sec. for the hurdles.

On the Sunday morning the team left for Middlesborough an industrial centre in Northern England. It was the birthplace of Captain Cook and the team had an opportunity of viewing his birthplace, his place of baptism, his school and other relics of interest to Australians.

On the Monday afternoon at the Acklam Park Cricket ground a meeting was held only Miss Strickland and Miss Johnston competing.

On Saturday the 5th July at the White City Stadium the team competed in the annual triangular match between England-Wales, Ireland and Scotland. The highlight of the performances were -

OFFICIAL CEREMONIES.

The High Commissioner of Australia, Sir Thomas White entertained all members of the Australian team at an afternoon party at Australia House.

The team was honoured to receive an invitation from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. to attend a reception at Buckingham Palace on Wednesday, 9th July, at which all members of Empire teams then in London were individually presented to Her Majesty, His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh, and Her Royal Highness Princess Margaret. Subsequent to the formal reception members of teams enjoyed the hospitality of Her Majesty who, together, with His Royal Highness and Her Royal Highness, conversed informally with her guests.

ACCOMMODATION

The women competitors were quartered at the Nurses Institute, a new building which is normally used as a Nurses Training School. Everything was spotlessly clean and all modern conveniences were available. The dining room was set out in cafeteria style, the food being excellent and plentiful. Meals at odd hours could always be arranged to suit a competitor and if anything special was required this was always forthcoming.

The Institute was an ideal setting for the women and they were all extremely comfortable and happy in these surroundings.

TRANSPORT.

Attached to the Institute were two large and two small buses. The large buses left the Institute on the hour and the half-hour doing the round trip to the stadium, swimming pool and then to the Olympic Village. If these times were not convenient the small buses were always available to transport the girls to their respective training grounds.

TRAINING.

A small cinders training ground, Elainetarah, a few hundred yards south of the main Stadium was always available for training, and the girls trained morning and afternoon.

PERFORMANCES OLYMPIC GAMES.

Of the women competitors Marjorie Jackson was the most outstanding, winning the 100 metres sprint equalling the world's record and creating a new Olympic record, and also winning the 200 metres sprint creating a new world and Olympic record. The next outstanding performances was that of Shirley Strickland in winning the 80 metres hurdles creating a new world and Olympic record. In addition Shirley was 3rd in the 100 metres.

Winsome Cripps gave two very creditable performances in gaining 4th place in both the 100 and 200 metres finals. In view of the fact that on both occasions her times were the same as the third placings, she was most unlucky in not winning a medal.

The 4th athlete Verna Johnston finished 8th in the broad Jump final.

The dropping of the baton in the relay was nothing short of a tragedy when victory was within sight. However, that is sport and nothing could be done about it.

CONDUCT.

The conduct of the girls throughout the tour was all that could be desired. At all times they were very friendly and popular with the members of the other countries. In Helsinki I received some very complimentary reports about their behaviour, particularly one from an American Manageress who stated that the best behaved girls in the Institute were "The New Zealanders, the South Africans and the Australians."

UNIFORM.

The alteration of the uniform to a material blouse and green shorts was a great improvement and was very distinctive.

CONCLUSION.

The traditional meeting British Empire v. United States was held at the White City Stadium on the 4th August and the four girl athletes were selected as member of the Australian Team to return to London for this meeting.

In the 4 x 100 yards relay the women's relay team made certain that they would have beaten the American relay team at the Helsinki Games but for the unfortunate baton dropping incident when they annexed the world's record with 46.3 sec. beating their rivals by 5 yards.

In the 4 x 220 yards relay a composite British team consisting of Jackson and Cripps and Maskell and Hasenjager of South Africa, returned a time of 1m. 38.7 sec. which established a new world's record, but being a composite team could not take the record. The record was awarded to the United States Team, 1 m. 40 sec.

APPRECIATION.

I would like to record my thanks and appreciation of the assistance and co-operation given by the General Manager, Mr. Uren. Although Mr. Uren had an extremely busy and difficult job to do he was always interested in the welfare and activities of the women.

To Mr. S. Grange, Swimming Manager and Mr. K. Donald, Athletics Manager, I would like to express my thanks for their co-operation.

My thanks are also extended to the other Sectional Managers for their courtesies on all occasions.

This enabled Miss Jackson and myself to meet women members of the newly formed Hong Kong A.A.C., whom we were able to assist with coaching. Prior to our departure, we were made Hon. Life Members of the Club.

We returned to Sydney on 19th, after an enjoyable, instructive and successful trip.

IN CONCLUSION.

The Union and the A.A.U. of A. have worked amicably throughout the period under review, and its officers have been most co-operative.

The method of selecting the women athletic representatives for Olympic and British Empire Games still leaves much to be desired. Although we can rightly claim that our candidates for representation in 1948 and again in 1952 had individually high and similar standards, the "All Australian" selectors appear to desire that various aspirants should be interspersed rather than those most qualified being first included.

This method of selection causes financial hardships to our affiliated bodies, as knowing the great potential of those placed low on the list by the selectors, they feel honour-bound to obtain the necessary additional money. Whereas with selection on merit individuals should have been near the top of the list and so be a general charge against Australia as a whole.

Another Australian International team will be shortly selected to represent us at Vancouver at the British Empire and Commonwealth Games.

We are confident that the representatives of this Union will justify selection as our girls have done in the past and prove worthy representatives of Australia - we wish them good luck and happy landings.
