Presented to delegates of affiliated Associations at the Twenty-Fifth Conference, held at the National Hotel, Brisbane, Queensland, at 7.30 p.m., Thursday, 5th March and at 9.30 a.m., Friday, 7th March, 1975.

Ladies,

The Twenty-fourth Report and Financial Statement of the Australian Women's Amateur Athletic Union is presented for your consideration.

1975 is Women's International Year and what a pleasing introduction we have experienced.

Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, recognised the contribution made by two of our State Honorary Secretaries, Maisie McQuiston (Victoria) and Flo Wrighter (N.S.W.), to our sport and community services with British Empire Medal awards. Our sincere and proud congratulations to each for these well-earned honours.

Additionally, the Australian Broadcasting Commission named Commonwealth Games gold medallist, Raylene Boyle as Sportsman of the Year.

We have considerable cause for concern due to the drop in registrations over the past year. We have an equal cause for concern in regard to lack of our younger members entering the ranks of administration.

Administration still remains in the hands of a small number of dedicated officials, which has frequently been a matter for criticism.

Our project for the year ahead must be recruitment - not only of competitors, but of young administrators.

AUSTRALIAN CROSS COUNTRY

Brisbane, August 25/26th 1974

At the 1974 Conference our State was allocated the Cross Country Championships in 1975. Almost two months later a

message came through that West Australia was to forgo the Titles as a request had been made by Queensland to conduct the titles in 1974. There is still a considerable amount of mystery surrounding the matter, as no minutes to my knowledge had been rescinded.

Queensland did all possible in the short space of time to try to make the Championships a success, but a lot more could have been done with a longer amount of time to organise.

The Cross Country was held in the beautiful setting of Limestone Park, Ipswich, where great interest was taken by the V.I.P.'s in the City.

The Opening Ceremony was performed by the Mayor of Ipswich, Alderman Hastings who erected Flag Poles and did everything possible for us. Mrs. Vi. Jordan, Dr. Edwards all Members of Parliament honoured us with their presence during the afternoon.

Almost 70 competitors participated in all events which was really good, considering that Cross Country is so young in Australia.

Some problems were created with the Road Relays and Road Walks as the Traffic Office in our City is very firm on road safety. Eventually all worked out to our satisfaction and these events were held at Industrial Road Wacol under Police Supervision at a cost of \$46.00 for 2½ hours.

Due to the Air Travel confusion at the time, it was very difficult to meet the visiting Teams, as planes were delayed and our Liaison Officers had much travelling to try to do the right thing by their respective States.

The weather was not too kind to us either, and on the Saturday it was very dull and overcast, & having rained on the previous Thursday night the black soil of Ipswich was not easy to negotiate.

On Sunday after competition a Smorgasboard Luncheon was held at the Main Motel, after which most of the Teams departed our City.

Our thanks go to all States, Visiting Officials, and each and every person who helped in any way. To Mr. Clinch for the fresh fruit given to all States, to Good Elf for the donation of Fruit Juices, and to Golden Circle and Coca Cola Bottlers for Soft Drinks provided for the competitors.

Brooks Trophy first Queensland girl in 5000 Metres Open C.C. - Jan Carter.INTERNATIONAL ROAD RACE, GUAYANILLA, PUERTO RICO
November, 3rd 1974

Your girls were selected to represent Australia in an International road race over 10,000 metres in Guayanilla, Puerto Rico on Sunday November 3rd 1974. These were Angela Cook, NSW, Jenny Orr, Vic., Lynne Tennant, Vic., and myself, Lavinia Petrie, Vic. I was also proud to be selected as captain/manageress and submit this report from the trip.

On arrival at Ponce we were greeted by about 30 cars loads of people who just about raised the roof of the airport building with their cheers and claps. We were then escorted (we felt like queens) about 30 Km to Guayanilla where we were to stay in private homes. This proved to be a very satisfactory arrangement. Incidentally our arrival at Ponce was after a 20 minute flight across to the other side of the island from San Juan in a 10 seater domestic aeroplane. The cars had headlights on and horns were blaring all the way. When we arrived at the outskirts of town they let off 3 firecrackers, like gun salutes, and the

same thing happened when we arrived in the town. This performance was repeated for the arrival of most teams, even at 2 and 3 am!

The race was organized by the Sertoma International Club which appears to be the equivalent of Rotary in Australia. The people that we were involved with couldn't do enough for us and were very impressed with the "Beautiful, friendly Australians" as we became known. We were transported in private cars and all meals were provided in the town's main restaurant which was very good.

Everyone had to attend for a routine medical examination on the day before the race. The weather was our main concern. The humidity was very high. It rained each day that we were there and on the Saturday it rained so much that the drains became blocked up and all communication was cut off. The river rose higher than it had ever been before. The day of the race was very hot 85°F and the humidity about 85. Seventy girls from 17 countries took part, the outright winner being Thalma Wright from Canada. Jenny Orr's performance to take 3rd place was a really tremendous effort and worthy of mention. Angela Cook placed 6th, Lavinia Petrie 7th and Lynne Tennant 10th. Trophies were presented to each country that was represented as an appreciation of participation. Each of the first ten placegetters received a trophy and the first three teams. Two girls comprised a team and we declared two teams. We took 2nd and 3rd places behind Canada thus bringing out total number of trophies to seven.

In the future should Australia send a team for this particular competition I would recommend that they travel one week before, as we found the time inadequate for acclimatization and recovery from the journey.

It was a most enjoyable trip and I would like to express appreciation to the Sertoma Club for providing us with the opportunity to compete by paying air fares for 3 girls and the Victorian Women's Association for the other air fare. The team spirit was very high during the whole of the time we were away.

I am very proud to have been associated with such a wonderful successful team.

NEW ZEALAND GAMES - CHRISTCHURCH 1975 (23,24,25,26
 January)

We all gathered in Melbourne on the 19th for an early take-off to Christchurch. A small crowd of well-wishers were there to see us off and after a slight delay through people not going to Immigration, we were on our way.

Upon arrival in Christchurch, we were met by officials from the Games and escorted back to Ilam Road Headquarters where we were documented for security and also Noel, John and I were informed of meal times and bus times for training at QEII Park.

The quarters were single room accommodation, but co-ed. There were no separate women's quarters. This only proved a slight problem, but as it is rumoured that Canada is doing this for the '76 Games, we felt that a separate floor for the girls be kept, with no men allowed between the hours of 11pm till 10am. When this was put to the members of the team, the majority were agreeable.

The meals were satisfying but uninteresting and lukewarm-to-cold no matter if you were there first or last, and after Tuesday when everyone had left, they were nearly uneatable. When complaints were made to the Caterer, we were told that there was nothing wrong with the meals - even when flies were found 'dead' in the bacon. If the complaint was persisted with, the person concerned was ordered from the dining room and not allowed to eat there again. It may be of interest to know that none of the resident officials ate in the dining room.

Medical facilities were good in the aspect that there was a doctor on call 24 hours a day and a Physio both at the Village and at QEII Ground, but no masseurs unless you went to a private person. I think it is essential that we be able to reach a masseur because these rubber tracks tend to tighten up the muscles and a light rub-down can ease this tension.

Security was excellent from the time we arrived till Tuesday when they finished and then anyone and everyone could just walk into the quarters, which meant everything had to be

kept locked at all times, and also we could not leave clothes in the drying cabinet.

Pre-and post-Games competition was provided; the pre-games on the Monday in freezing rain - needless to say quite a few declined the offer and stayed home. The post-games competition was held in Auckland and as we were 29 all told, they considered this too large to pay expenses to Auckland then back to Wellington, so we stayed in Christchurch.

Some members of the team were invited to private homes, but on the whole we were left much to ourselves and the day was spent training and resting.

The girls did exceptionally well on the track with only a few not bettering their personal best performances, but all learning a little from the overseas competitors. At this stage I would like to extend my congratulations to the girls on their "sportsmanship", both on and off the field.

I would like to sincerely thank my Captain, Charlene Rendina, for all her kindness and help during the 12 days in which we were away. The Avon will never be the same again.

To Noel Ruddock, the Manager and to John Daly, Coach, my sincere thanks for all the help they gave to me on my first managerial job.

And last, I would like to thank the Union for giving me this opportunity to repay at least a small amount of the pleasure that this sport has given to me over the years.

To try to create more Interclub interest the 1974-75 season was to commence without any of the usual scratch events for grading purposes and went straight into Interclub, with all new competitors in "E" grade until performances were registered.

Unfortunately the first day was washed out, and the Interclub which followed the Schoolgirls Track Titles was only half way through when rain intervened again.

This happened several days, and it happened each time when the same programme should have been run, making the points scored by the Clubs very lopsided.

Two yardage days saw more yardage State Records broken or established, and gives the competitors more encouragement to aim for the records already established in the yardage system.

A report and the results of the Australian Cross-Country has already been made elsewhere.

Our own Cross-Country was only partially successful, and although quite a few extra competitors came along, the fun of Cross-Country running seems lacking.

This may have been due to the fact that most were trying to gain a position in the State Team in their own State.

Both the Schoolgirls Cross-Country and Track and Field were once again an outstanding success, with more and more entries in each group. Many good schoolgirl athletes were recruited and the registrations are at a high level for the State. We have 30 seniors, 88 juniors, 306 Sub-Juniors and 65 officials for 1974-75. The fact that Australian Championships had to be held within a twelve month period here, seems to have given an unusually keen interest to the Schoolgirls, which we hope will continue for a few more years.

Two of our athletes were invited to compete in the first New Zealand Games in January, Misses Denise Robertson and Erica Nixon.

All the best is wished all the athletes who travel to Christchurch.

On the sadder side of the season, one of our most promising young athletes Laura Langton was tragically killed in the early part of the season and she will be missed by her many friends.

For the second time a Team of Sub-Junior athletes will travel, this time to Perth over the Australia Day Weekend. The team will compete in an Interstate Match for the L.C. Mills Cup.

We are hoping to affiliate three more Country Clubs for the next season making a total of 30 Clubs in our State altogether.

Congratulations are offered to Western Australia for a successful Cross-Country Championship in 1975.

SOUTH AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S AMATEUR ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The past year has been a mixed one for our Association with the installation of the new "Tartan" track at the Olympic Sports Field being the highlight.

In March, 1974, we had the honour of conducting the Australian Women's Track and Field Championships, and as this is a subject of a separate report, I shall not dwell on it here. However, suffice it to say that the many hours of hard work entailed in the organisation and conduct of the Titles were completely off-set by their success.

The Cross-Country season provided a very full programme, and it was rewarding that our girls should have acquitted themselves so well in the National Championships in Brisbane. Cross-Country running is becoming more popular each year, and the number of venues within easy access to the City area enable the athletes to enjoy a varied season.

It was with regret that the State Primary and Secondary Schoolgirls' Championships for 1974 were cancelled owing to a lack of venue in Adelaide, but we trust that the disappointment

of the athletes will be more than compensated by the opportunity to compete on "Tartan" this year. In addition, the Commonwealth Banking Corporation has agreed to sponsor these Championships by way of medallions to place-getters. This is a most significant contribution as it often eventuated that the winner of an event would receive nothing to show for her efforts, and with an increase of 4,481 (1,422.5%) entries over the past 10 years, the Association would have been unable to provide trophies such as these. We are looking forward to a long and mutually satisfying relationship with the Commonwealth Bank.

At time of writing, the "Tartan" track is nearing completion, the Official Opening being scheduled for February 16th, and the Inter-Club season has been conducted on grass at University Park 9 Oval meanwhile. For the first time in many years, we have recorded a drop in the number of registrations with our sub-junior ranks still holding most promise. The team sent to Perth to contest the Sub-Junior match will no doubt bear this out.

At our Annual General Meeting in May last year, three Life Membership Awards were granted, the recipients being Mesdames D.L. Barnes, M.M. Heffernan and Mr. H. Stobar. Mr. Stobar has the distinction of being the first male to be awarded Life Membership of this Association.

It is comparatively rare to find young athletes, male or female, making constructive contributions to the sport. One such person is Mr. Allan Derris who, with the sponsorship of the S.A.W.A.A.A., has designed and developed an electronic eight watch timing system which will be used extensively at the Olympic Sports Field. The installation of the new track has enabled us to have all wiring etc., placed underground, and the system will be connected electrically to a public display board.

The appointment of our President, Mrs. W.M. Ey, Dip. Phys. Ed., T.P.T.C., to the State and Federal Sports Councils have been well-earned and richly deserved, and reflects the high regard in which she is held. Mrs. Ey was granted sabbatical leave for four months of 1974 to further research into physical education in the United Kingdom, Europe and the United States of America.

Jenny Symon stormed one of the last bastions of masculinity in Adelaide when she was awarded the Amateur Sports Club Medallion for her outstanding contributions to athletics in South Australia. She is the first woman ever to receive one of these medallions.

It again gives me pleasure to record the close harmony enjoyed by the S.A.W.A.A.A. and S.A.A.A.A. The spirit of co-

operation and progressive thinking can only augur well for the future of amateur athletics in South Australia.

To Queensland W.A.A.A., our best wishes for a successful 1975 Track & Field Championship.

This has been a year of great anxiety for the future of our Union. The outlook at present is much brighter and it is reasonable to assume that, with the co-operation of all States, this situation should continue.

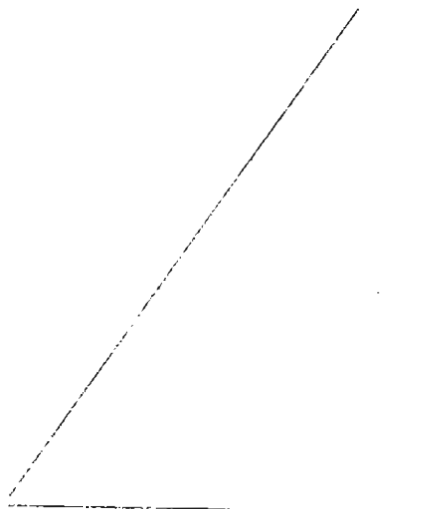
I appreciate the assistance and support given by all over the past few months and particularly thank the Secretary and the Executive.
