## **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**



## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Athletics Australia has embraced a large number of projects during the past twelve months. The resources of our organisation have been extended to accommodate every aspect of the Sport to ensure progress has occurred. At all times, our strategy has been to seek increases in participation at all levels and to present the high performance athletes with opportunities to compete with distinction domestically and internationally.

The highlight of the year was the Barcelona Olympic Games, but there were several other results which confirmed that our strategies were achieved. Barcelona results were a mixture of success and failures, with our young team producing eleven individual Top 16 results and with our two women's relays reaching finals. The Australian Olympic Committee endorsed thirty-nine athletes; however, the selection method came in for criticism and dampened the good work the athletes, coaches and administrators had produced in the previous three years. Athletics Australia accepts that our sport is part of a large Australian Olympic Family, and needs to recognise that the modern Olympics are reserved for Australians with unique talent. Much has been written and said about the selection policy, and the Board has, once again, called for a review to find another formula which achieves cohesion, acceptance and better results during the next Olympiad.

The medals won by Daniela Costian and Tim Forsyth were both great results, whilst Michelle Lock (400m), Melinda Gainsford (200m), Renee Poetschka (400m), Louise McPaul (Javelin), Alison Inverarity (HJ), Kerry Saxby (10K Walk), David Culbert (LJ), Sean Carlin (HT), Werner Reiterer (DT) and the women's 400m and 1600m relays, all excelled in the Olympic arena. Cathy Freeman (400m), Dean Capobianco (200m), Dean Smith (Decathlon), Simon Baker (50K Walk) and Kerry Johnson (100m) only just missed a Top 16 result. Congratulations are extended to the Team Management led by Dr. John Daly who prepared the tour, managed the difficulties with a special understanding, and at all times maintained a professional approach.

During the year, the commissioned Task Force, led by John Landy and Barry Stanton, completed the Development Plan 1993 - 1996 and beyond, and recommended a new structure for the administration of Athletics Australia. The latter will be determined at the General Meeting in Sydney on 28th November. It is to be hoped that delegates vote wisely on the critical issues. Our thanks are expressed to John Landy, Barry Stanton and members of the Task Force Commission - Kathy Edwards (SA), John Atterton (NSW), John Ackraman (Q) and Peter Bowman (AIS) for their contribution and efforts during the past eighteen months in preparing a detailed Development Plan for Athletics Australia along the lines proposed by the Australian Sports Commission. The worth of the document will only be measured by actions of the Board, and State Associations' efforts to achieve change and improve efficiency.

Financially, the Board and the Administration have produced another satisfactory result, ensuring viability and stability in the short term. This has been achieved in a sluggish market and reflects credit on the Finance Committee, the Board and the General Manager for their efforts and decisions. Athletics Australia purchased their own premises in September, and will operate from the North Melbourne Office from early December. The

Treasurer will report on this and other financial matters to the Annual General Meeting.

With the departure of long-serving Mrs. Jeanette Brown from the Administration, the office has restructured its internal administration and appointed Mr. Geoff Rowe to the new position of Business Manager. I wish to acknowledge Mrs. Brown's long service to A.A.U. and A.A. during her employment.

Athletically, Athletics Australia has participated in several World Championship events: Junior Track and Field, Road Race Walking Cup, Half Marathon, Cross Country. At the world class Chiba Relays in Japan, the Australian team consisting of Steve Moneghetti, Andrew Lloyd, Rod Higgins, Malcolm Norwood and Paul Arthur won the event. Several S.E. Asian developmental tours have taken place, as well as tours to U.S.A.

A lot of energy is required to produce the summer Grand Prix Series, and whilst Athletics Australia believes the Series can be better streamlined and supported, our Competition Manager, Brian Roe, is to be congratulated, along with each State Meet Director, for the success of the 1992 Sugar Games and the Mobil Grand Prix. Daniela Costian and Tim Forsyth were presented with the female and male 'Athlete of the Year' Awards at the Grand Prix Dinner in Adelaide, and later saluted their medal achievements at the Olympic Games. Both these athletes indicate the significant results from the Series are, I hope, an inspiration to their colleagues.

Junior Development maintained steady progress throughout the year with Board Member Kathy Edwards heading the Junior Commission. Kevin Oakey, as full-time Junior Development Officer, has developed this important segment with the help of an active committee and sponsorship from both Sugar and Mars. The Mars scheme has been revamped and better results are already recorded. The Australian Team competed at the World Junior Track and Field Championships in Seoul and again produced several outstanding results. Medal winners were Cathy Freeman (200m), Tim Forsyth (HJ), Brendan Hanigan (800), Jane Saville (5000m Walk) whilst other young Australians reached finals. I would like to congratulate all Team members, the management and our sponsor, Sugar, for further enhancing the strong tradition and credibility of the Australian Junior Athletics Programme.

Coaching has further diversified nationally under the financial support of the Australian Sports Commission and the Australian Institute of Sport, as well as State Governments. The Board does feel concerned that the direction and structure of coaching requires addressing if the financial investment in athletes is to be maximised. I believe this to be the single most important development necessary during the next Olympiad. The continued support of the A.T. & F.C.A. is greatly appreciated, whilst this report wishes to acknowledge the many coaches who travelled with teams during the past year, the National Event Coaches, as well as the full-time and volunteer coaches operating all over Australia.

Sponsorship and Government support remains critical for the future of athletics. Last year, the Australian Sports Commission injected \$ 467,000 directly into Athletics, whilst it spent \$ 1,800,000 on other athletic programmes. The control of the latter funding operation is not under A.A.'s responsibility, yet at the end of the day, the sport is judged to have achieved disappointing results. I believe that those projects organised by Athletics Australia have proved successful and that the Australian Sports Commission's review of athletics needs to take our comments into consideration. A.A. is

indebted to the Australian Institute of Sport and the State Institutes for their contribution to our Sport, whilst our acknowledgement of the Australian Sports Commission's funding is recorded.

Athletics Australia has established an excellent working relationship with its major sponsors: The Queensland Sugar Corporation, Mobil Oil Australia, Mars and N.E.C. We also consider Australian Sports Commission's financial support as major sponsorship status. Both the Sugar Games and the Mobil Grand Prix require television exposure, but to attract this we require more Australians (in depth) producing world Top 16 performances, and several internationally high profile athletes racing the circuit. To achieve television and overseas competitors for Athletics is ridiculously expensive (\$250,000) in the current market, and until commercial television wants athletes, Athletics Australia will not achieve one of its ultimate goals. The support and individual efforts by our Australian athletes is to be applauded, but we do require even greater focus on our Grand Prix Series.

Athletics Australia has the responsibility of giving direction to the States in many areas of our Sport with participation (schools, clubs and talent identification), high performance, coaching, sponsorship, marketing and promotion the main concerns. It remains more than a challenge to harness all players in our diversified sport, and to not only talk of commonalities, but to exercise a desire to work together to achieve better results. I felt 1990 almost achieved a maximum athletic, coaching and financial result; but that 1992 fell short of our target. Let us all commit ourselves towards Atlanta and beyond for together there is great strength in Athletics Australia.

In conclusion, I wish to thank again the Australian Sports Commission and the Institute for their support, also I extend Athletics Australia's appreciation to the Australian Olympic Committee for their financial support and congratulate the A.O.C. and the many sports who produced so many outstanding results in Barcelona. To our Administration in Melbourne, led by Neil King, I express our appreciation for their efforts, and to the Board and all Committees a special thank you for your contribution to our Sport.

## STAFF REPORTS

## REPORT of the GENERAL MANAGER

Athletics has often been known as the "banner sport" of the Olympic Games and 1992 being an Olympic year, it was expected that our sport's profile would be raised considerably. Such was the case. We had a strong domestic programme of high profile events throughout the country. A long and often controversial selection process culminated with the largest Olympic Athletic Team to compete outside Australia.

Despite the fact that some of our athletes failed to meet their own high expectations, I was especially proud of their efforts and grateful for the commitment from all concerned with the Olympic programme. The legacy provided is a young group of hardened athletes who will lead us through the next four years.

### Administration

In line with good business practice, the National Office is subject to constant review. We have finally computerised the financial system of Athletics Australia and are currently updating our information and computer system.

### Staff

Following the recommendation in 1991, Brian Roe has been appointed as Competition Manager. Brian's knowledge of the sport, commitment to the athletes and professional approach to the position has proven to be invaluable.

Without singling out individual members of staff, the office staff has served the sport tirelessly and have worked well beyond the call of duty, and I am indebted to those staff members who have displayed that duty and loyalty. Special thanks to Mabel Robinson for her tireless help, love of the sport and for continuing that long tram ride from Malvern each day. Mabel has announced her retirement and I hope she will continue to serve the sport she loves so much.

### New Office Facilities

After a lengthy search for new headquarters, Athletics Australia has purchased premises at 21 O'Shanassy Street, North Melbourne. The two storey offices were previously owned by a Melbourne based Union and are located in a quiet residential street offering close access to the City and the Tullamarine Freeway. After appropriate re-furbishing, it is anticipated that we will move into the new offices in December, 1992.

## **Sponsorships**

Despite the serious economic downturn, Athletics Australia is strongly supported by some of Australia's most important and large corporate citizens. The nature of business is constantly changing and the sport is reacting to these changes by offering our sponsors constant review. We must appear to react to the requirements of our sponsors at all times.

## **Queensland Sugar Corporation**

It is gratifying to be able to boast that one of our major primary industries has been the backbone of athletics for a period of seven years.

It can now be truly stated that current athletes, the majority of whom have been influenced by the success of the Junior Development Programme, will carry the sport through to Atlanta in 1996.

During the 1991/92 season, Sugar sponsored our major Sugar Games Series in Hobart, Sydney, Brisbane, Adelaide and the National Championships, as well as playing an important role at all other Meets and the Sugar Junior National Championships.

I would like to express the personal thanks of David Prince and myself to David Rutledge, Chief Executive of the Queensland Sugar Corporation, and to Susan Kelly, Communication Manager, whose professional and innovative approaches have totally enhanced our current programme.

## **Mobil**

As with the International Grand Prix Series in Europe, the Mobil Grand Prix Athletic Series in Australia is the golden thread which ties together our domestic competition programme and is based on head to head clashes. John Landy stated recently that he believes that our athletes must firstly prove themselves in domestic competition before considering any international competition. The Mobil Grand Prix Series supplies that important base.

Is it a mere coincidence that our two Grand Prix Athletes of the Year in 1992, Daniela Costian and Tim Forsyth, were also Olympic medallists in Barcelona?

Our special thanks to Ron Burke from Mobil Australia for his support to athletics which, we know, is more than just a business interest and to Colin Hodge for his tireless commitment and personable approach with other sponsors, State Associations and athletes.

We would also like to acknowledge our great friend, Hassa Mann and wish him well in his new role with the Melbourne Football Club.

## **Australian Sports Commission**

Over the past ten years and, in particular the last four years, Australian athletes have received tremendous financial and moral support from the Australian Sports Commission. Although acknowledged as our major sponsor by their very nature, they will never receive the same kudos or profile as the corporate sector. Their invaluable support provides our administration with

stability and strength and is the backbone of our domestic and international competition programmes.

We would like to express our sincere appreciation to Jim Ferguson, Chief Executive of the Australian Sports Commission, Steve Arnaudon, Ken Norris, Steven Fox, Neil Richardson and the other dedicated personnel and the Board of the Australian Sports Commission.

### **Australian Institute of Sport**

Peter Bowman and his coaching staff at the Australian Institute of Sport once again provide the sport of athletics with tremendous support. The A.I.S. and Athletics Australia worked closely over the last twelve months to enhance the elite programme, support the domestic competition programme and provide commitment and motivation to our major international events and small group tours.

### **The Task Force**

The Task Force was charged with two responsibilities:

1. To produce a Development Plan carrying us through from 1992 to 1996.
2. To recommend to the 1992 Annual General Meeting of Athletics Australia a re-structure of the government of the sport.

John Landy, as Chairman of the Task Force, and Barry Stanton have worked tirelessly over the past twelve months to achieve these two objectives. The Development Plan is acknowledged as one of the most extensive of its kind and will be used by other sports as a blueprint for their own development.

A formal recommendation has been made to the Member Associations regarding the re-structure of the Board and the Congress will determine this factor.

By nature, athletics has a four year cycle. We know that our sport is unique and is one of the hardest sports to administer, co-ordinate and promote. It is also one of the most competitive sports internationally. Whilst we recognise the enormity of the task of promoting athletics in Australia, we also recognise the great benefits to be gained by national self-image and the motivation to our youth.

In closing, I would like to express my thanks to David Prince, the members of the Board and my staff for their help and support during the year.

### Coach Development

### Competition

#### i) Domestic

The success of the domestic season may be measured by the achievement of some 100 IAAF Olympic qualifying performances by 51 athletes.

#### ii) International

The follow-up major competitions were scheduled and reports of these have been circulated.

- a. World Cross Country Championships
- b. World Walks Cup
- c. World Marathon Championships
- d. World Championships

In addition, a tour of Europe, similar to 1990, was conducted and results distributed. The noticeable feature was the lack of appreciation by athletes and their personal coaches of how difficult it is to gain entry to major GP events unless an athlete had a world ranking in the top 10 - 20. Top 50 is merely a starting point.

Performance trials were again conducted and again athletes who struggled to pass their trials struggled in Europe.

### The Squads

The introduction of direct funding assistance from the Australian Olympic Committee led to a re-vamp of the squad system.

1. The AOC Squad - a performance level which is superior to the level of performance that would allow entry to the final 16 at the Olympics.
2. The AIS Squad - a performance superior to the 1988 IAAF Olympic standard.
3. The National Squad - a performance approximately midway between the Commonwealth Games standard and the 1988 and the 1988 Olympic Games standard.

## INTEGRATION PROGRAMME

As a result of observation, I believe that we have been providing opportunities in our sport for people with disabilities for many years, the anecdotal evidence suggests that there are quite a significant number of club athletes with a disability, also coaches with disabled athletes, and clubs who are actively integrating. (I will conduct a survey to determine the extent of this involvement in 1992/93.) In addition, many State/Territory Athletic Associations are liaising with disability organisations, or have aided these groups by furnishing officials, etc. for their programmes.

Consequently, I foresee that my position at Athletics Australia as the Integration Co-Ordinator will provide assistance and support to the State/Territory Athletic Associations in their continued move toward integration. At the national level, Athletics Australia will work toward the provision of a National Championships for all disability groups, liaise with AT & FCA for coaching accreditation, explore additional avenues for integration, and develop resources in order to achieve these tasks.

The integration project (Programmes for Athletes with Disabilities) and therefore co-ordinators' description will be altered for the upcoming year to avoid confusion created by over long titles. The Co-Ordinator will become the 'Integration Co-Ordinator', while the original project title will be put aside.

An Integration Committee has been formed which will serve to give support and advice to the Co-Ordinator. This committee consists of five members:

During November/December 1991, Athletics Australia conducted Paralympic selection trails for intellectually disabled athletes. In addition, athletes with a disability compete at our National Championships in March, 1992. These beginnings will give us a foundation on which to build for the future.

During my initial employment, the last four months of 1991/92, I began working at establishing communication links with State/Territory Athletic Associations and the disability organisations. It was also necessary to draft a development plan which has been subsequently distributed to all Athletic Associations. However, alterations to the Development Plan have become necessary primarily with regard to the time line, of a necessity to give integration within State/Territory Associations priority.

## **REPORT OF THE JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT OFFICER**

The 1991/1992 season has been one of the busiest for a number of years, with the introduction of new programmes and tours for junior athletes.

The Junior Development Programme was fortunate to receive continued support from the Queensland Sugar Corporation. This support added to the commitment from the Australian Sports Commission allowed us to operate all junior activities which are now standard in the junior programme, as well as a number of new activities.

### **Australian Junior Sugar Squad**

The selection criteria for the Australian Junior Squad was reviewed this year with the intention of making the squad more competitive for selection and to reduce the numbers by 20 - 25 athletes. This process was conducted by the Junior Event Coaches and ratified by the National Selectors.

Following the review, the Sugar Junior Squad was selected in June and announced after the finish of the Olympics. With the continuation of the support from the QSC, the squad will receive a specially designed windcheater and cap from Sugar.

### **National Junior Event Group Coaches**

These coaches again continued to support the programme by attending the All Schools in Melbourne, the Junior Nationals in Canberra and conducting the September Camp in Canberra.

There was one change in personnel during the year, with Bohdan Babijczuk taking over the jumps portfolio from Graham Boase. We were also deeply saddened upon the death of Alan Iverson who held the Multi-Events portfolio so enthusiastically for so many years.

### **NSP Development Camps**

With the allocation of \$90,000 from ASC through the NSP and support funding from QSC, Athletics Australia were again able to conduct three training camps for junior athletes.

The first was the annual Australian Junior Squad Training Camp held in Canberra in September, 1991. This was perhaps the best camp conducted so far with many athletes able to receive a range of testing and educational lectures. Because of the increase in the battery of tests done with athletes, it was important that numbers be maintained to a workable level. This was one of the reasons behind the change in selection criteria for the Australian Junior Sugar Squad.

The second camp was the inaugural Cross Country Camp held in Canberra in January, 1992. Again it was very successful and all the athletes appreciated the new support and recognition being given the Cross Country through the Junior Development Programme.

The third camp was also the annual Australian Junior Team Preparation Camp held in Canberra in June, 1992. Again another very successful camp aimed at preparing the athletes for the 1992 World Junior Championships later in the year.

### **Australian Junior Teams**

The cancellation of the proposed APOSA Festival in Brisbane where the Australian Junior Team was scheduled to compete against the Japanese, Chinese and South Koreans left us with a huge problem in finding suitable competition for our athletes. A replacement match against N.Z. U/23 team was arranged for January, 1992, to be held in Auckland, N.Z. The change in date resulted in many athlete replacements and the final team to depart was very much a "developmental" group of athletes. The last minute changes and arrangements for this team over the Christmas period caused many headaches, but the experience gained by the athletes was invaluable.

The other team to tour was the inaugural Junior "B" Cross Country Team which also travelled to N.Z. to compete at the N.Z. School Cross Country Championships. The aim of the tour is to provide experience and encouragement to junior cross country athletes to assist their development towards World Cross Country representation. The tour was very successful and the athletes performed well.

### **Mars 5 Star Achievement Award Scheme**

After much negotiation and numerous presentations, Athletics Australia and Mars Confectionary of Australia came to an agreement with regards to the operation of the Mars 5 Star Achievement Award Scheme.

Athletics Australia now has control over the operation of the programme and is responsible for co-ordination with State Associations for its implementation in schools throughout Australia. Because of the lower overheads in administering the program, Athletics Australia was able to add into the package the sponsorship of the Australian All Schools Championships and support sponsorship of State All Schools Championships.

With the increased workload associated with this program, Athletics Australia appointed a part-time officer to handle the distribution of material and to collect and collate figures relevant to the programme.

Although I believe it will be difficult to achieve the figures set by Mars for the first year of operation, I am sure that we can show significant improvement from previous years which will instill some confidence in Mars to continue their sponsorship for another two years.

### **Schools' Knockout Competition**

This competition is entering its third year after being piloted in SA in 1990. In 1991, five states conducted a School Knockout Competition with the remaining three scheduled to participate in 1992 to make a fully national competition.

The feedback received from teachers, athletes, coaches and State Association about this competition is very positive and it is felt that this competition could be developed into one of the major schools' athletic competitions.

The only further requirement to achieve major competition status is to conduct a National Schools Knockout Final. This is needed to cap off the competition and to provide incentive to the schools to continue. To do this relies heavily on obtaining a sponsor for the program. Although a number of positive "feelers" have been received, we are still no further to finding a sponsor than we were this time last year. This situation needs to be given high priority for the continuation of the Schools Knockout Competition.,

### **Schools**

With the Task Force identifying the need for Athletics Australia to place greater importance on the development of athletics in schools, the Junior Development Program began a few new directives. Apart from the renewed Mars 5 Star drive and the Schools Knockout Competition, the JDC is co-ordinating with the A.S.S.C. and the ASC to provide a better athletics programme for school children through combined athletic events and Aussie Sport programme.

### **Review**

The last year has seen an even better working relationships developed between Athletics Australia and the State Associations with a large proportion of the State Development Programmes beginning to mesh well with an overall National Development Programme. The State Associations' assistance in conducting new and existing programmes has been excellent and is bound to continue to improve. The fact that seven of the eight (except NT) State Associations now have a Development Officer is also promising for the continuing operation of athletic programmes in schools and for junior athletes.

The status of the Athletics Australia Junior Development Programme should now be one of strengthening the existing activities before embarking on new ones. In this way, I am sure positive results will be shown over the next 2 - 3 years.

## AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

ACT Athletics has undertaken significant reforms during the last two years to improve our administration and financial position, the structure of track and field competition, our focus on athletes' needs, our credibility, our appreciation of the importance of sponsors and our recognition of our hardworking officials. ACT Athletics has received significant recognition by sponsors, Members of Parliament, the A.I.S., Athletics Australia and athletes generally, for the professional manner in which it conducts its competitions and its business affairs. This enhancement of credibility has resulted in increased sponsorships, increased numbers at interclub meets, better gate receipts and improved media coverage.

During the course of the year, the Association successfully ran the inaugural Combined Australian Cross Country Championships, involving athletes from primary school through to veterans. The Sugar Australian Under 16/18 Track and Field Championships, incorporating the Multi-Event Championships were also a major feature of the season. The Championships were acclaimed as a resounding success with multiple Australian records and World Junior qualifying times being achieved.

ACT Athletics continued its successful involvement with major special events: The Seiko-AIS Classic and the AIS-Coca Cola Distance Meet, resulted in good performances and large crowds in attendance (over 2000 attended the Seiko-AIS Classic). The Association also conducted, as a first, the "Women's Only" Track and Field Meet which received very positive feedback as a first event. The Commonwealth Bank ACT Track and Field Championships again proved to be a success with a record level of entrants and a large number of top class athletes pursuing Olympic Qualifying times. In all these events on the track, the ACT infrastructure again proved to be at its best, in terms of producing good times and good performances.

On the broad development front, ACT Athletics successfully initiated the formation of the Athletics Council, for which Brian Gleeson (President) is the Chair. Meetings of that Council (includes participation from all athletic representative bodies) have been very productive in ensuring that the directions for Athletics have strong support across all athletic bodies and our message will be more closely considered because of our collective membership rates. I consider that the Council will become more important, given the number of demographic and political changes that are likely to impact on the running of athletics in the ACT. The various development activities conducted under the auspices of the ACT Athletics were very well received. The NIB Talent Identification Squad, in particular, highlighted how some successes can be achieved through good management and appropriate financial sponsorship.

During the year, ACT Athletics received excellent support through sponsorship from the Australian Institute of Sport, Mobil, Sugar, Commonwealth Bank, NIB Health Fund, Computer Sciences of Australia, Ansett Airlines, Wiffens, Coca-Cola Bottlers, Capital Parkroyal, Seiko and Onga Pumps. Without these sponsors, the Association would not have been able to achieve the results that it has both on the track and administratively. In acquitting

this funding, the Association has worked very hard in ensuring that sponsors are adequately serviced.

In summary, ACT Athletics continued its improved performances on and off the track during 191-92 and is planning, through its Development Plan, to meet the future challenges with increased enthusiasm.

## ATHLETICS NEW SOUTH WALES

Athletics New South Wales has enjoyed a positive year in terms of participation and development.

Highlights of our 1991/92 year include another increase in registered members and an improvement in our financial operations. Significant growth in our development area has occurred by the employment of a Junior Development Officer and closer liaison with all other affiliated athletic bodies.

ANSW has also redefined the duties of its coaching/development co-ordinator to prioritise recruitment (at all levels), junior development and Talent I.D. A three year club regional development programme has been initiated with a view to strengthening the "club/coaching/facilities" structure of our sport.

A very strong marketing commission is having considerable success in the promotion and sponsorship areas with an increasing number of "special" events being staged in NSW. No doubt the public awareness of athletics has been heightened by the Olympics, our own domestic GP Series and, of course, the Sydney 2000 Bid.

It is our intention to capitalise on these activities to maximise future development of both our summer and winter participation.

## ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA

1991/92 was no different for AAWA than any other global organisation: a period of profound change. This trend for change has been continuous for some years, and matches the improved achievements at all levels of athletes, officials and administrators.

### **West Australian Athletic Federation**

The most far-reaching event for WA was the formation of WAAF. This umbrella body was born from the Athletic Review which took place in 1991. Fortunately, AAWA is represented on the Interim Board of WAAF by two Board Members, which means that the interests of AAWA are not neglected.

A Development Officer commenced duties, basically to formulate a plan of regionalisation for the future. The report from this officer is eagerly awaited. Imminent is the appointment of a General Manager, who will principally allocate funds, assist policy formulation and promote total athletic development throughout the community.

What is gratifying with the restructuring of athletics in WA is that each component body, which includes AAWA, will remain in charge of its own destiny. Meetings between WAAF and its components have clearly removed any threats to the formation of the various groups.

### **Competition**

An Olympic year always produces outstanding performances. A record of six WA athletes were selected for Olympic representation, with five eventual competitors, two of whom competed in finals.

Following the Olympics, four non-Olympians competed at the World Cup, and a further six contested the World Junior Championships, all with mixed, but encouraging, results. Two Australian records were set by WA athletes.

The depth of competition in WA was emphasised during the Nationals in Adelaide and Canberra. Particularly encouraging were the relay successes.

The Perth leg of the Grand Prix, competitively, was a well-conducted event. Other sporting contests (like the opening match of the World Cup cricket) detracted from attendances, but not performances. It is anticipated that a change of day and date in 1993 will promote the event even more.

### **Administration**

AAWA has experienced a degree of staff and volunteer mobility, mainly due to the Athletic Review. Thanks must go to those people who have assumed roles, often at short notice, with willingness and skill.

As in all sporting areas, sponsorship is tight. In WA, competent and dedicated sponsors have shown continued faith in the sport to continue, some at greater levels, others not so. Thanks are due to the Dairy Industry of WA (for Senior Competition), to Shell Australia (for Junior Development), and to sponsors of Special Events and programmes (Healthway, Mobil, Mars, Masters, Commonwealth Bank).

Within the office, equipment upgrading is continuing. A small but enthusiastic group continues to plough through the mountains of administrivia that traditionally beset such personnel. However, attempts are afloat to provide job descriptions for both personnel and Board members. These formalisations of positions will clarify specific tasks and allow people to perform at their levels of expertise, rather than assume too much responsibility too often.

Generally, athletics in WA continues to improve, with initiative and foresight. There is still a great deal to evolve within the sport, but the signs are extremely encouraging, both from grass roots, as well as an elite level.

## ATHLETICS TASMANIA

The highlights of the 1991/92 season have been provided by the achievements of the athletes who were selected in the squad to represent Australia at the Barcelona Olympic Games.

In the previous 96 years only four from track and field have achieved the ultimate goal and now in the one Games the number has increased 75%. Gail Luke, Susan Andrews and Simon Hollingsworth were selected as the 1992 representatives, joining Bill Barwick (1500 metres) 1932, David Lean (400m hurdles and 4 x 400m relay) 1956 and the only medal winner, Heather Innes (Javelin) 1956 and David Chettle (Marathon) 1972.

At the Australian Open and under 20 Championships in Adelaide, Tasmania won six gold medals which compares very favourably with Western Australia's seven, South Australia's three and Australian Capital territory's two. In addition, two silver and three bronze were won whilst at the under 16 and 18 Championships in Canberra, the tally was three gold, five silver and eight bronze, a very commendable total of twenty-five medals won by eighteen individuals. As a result of good form throughout the year capped by victories in under 20 Championships, Andrew Hughes, Steven Kingston and Brendan Hanigan have been selected to compete in the World Junior Championships in Seoul.

Another very important achievement has been the IAAF Veterans' Pin being awarded to Graeme Briggs, A.M., an honour very richly deserved.

The Australian Institute of Sport appointed a Track and Field Coach to Tasmania during the year. John Quinn who has already had quite an impact on coaching in the State,

The Association introduced split Winter and Summer registrations which was accepted quite well and resulted in a small increase. The Southern Branches' initiative in purchasing electronic timing and video photo finish system has proved extremely successful. Results are almost instantaneous and replays have satisfied a number of runners who disputed decisions.

For the second year in succession, Tasmanian athletes have lost two great stalwarts with the deaths of Mavis Ebzery, OAM and Des Hardstaff. Both passed away after relatively short illnesses.

Mavis retired from the administrative side two years ago, but continued to act as a starter until last year, completing over forty years association with the sport. She helped to reform women's athletics after the war and became the inaugural secretary of the Tasmanian Women's Amateur Athletic Association, a position she held until amalgamation with the Men's Association in 1981. Mavis's great service was rewarded with Life Membership of the Australian Women's Union, as well as the Tasmanian Association. She was Assistant Manager/Chaperone of the 1964 Olympic Athletics Team.

Des Hardstaff, after being an active competitor came back to athletics as an official, coach and administrator and managed several teams to Australian Championships. Both will be greatly missed.

## NORTHERN TERRITORY ATHLETIC COUNCIL

NT Athletic Council incorporates NT Athletics Association, NT Little Athletics Association, AT&FCA (NT), NT Athletics Officials Club, NT School Sports Council (Athletics).

The period 1.04.1991 through to 30.06.1992 included two major athletic events. The first, the Arafura Games, included three evening athletic meets with competitors from several South east Asia countries. In order to keep action going, the Council agreed to conducting some invitation Little Athletic events in the older age groups. This was well received by athletes and the crowd.

In April 1992, the NTAC conducted the athletic component of the Pacific School Games for 1200 athletes. In spite of the weather (Darwin was on a cyclone watch for one day), a very full and tight programme was completed on time.

Athletes competed in the All Schools Track and Field in December, and in the under 16/18 and under 20/Open Track and Field Championships in March. For the first time, a number of NT officials attended the Nationals and acquitted themselves well, some gaining Level 2 accreditation.

The NT hosted the women's 4 x 100 relay team for acclimatisation before the Tokyo Championships, and some of Craig Hilliard athletes before Barcelona. This has certainly created interest in the community, and is especially appreciated by the NT Government which has a very strong commitment to sport.

Track and Field for seniors remains very small. Remote areas have very real problems in catering for senior athletes. It may be appropriate to have a joint Little Athletics/seniors meeting to discuss mutual support in remote areas.

Courses have been held by AT&FCA (NT) and NT Officials' Club, thus broadening the support base for the sport.

Retention of athletes, officials and supporters must be a prime objective for the future. The NTAC sees the survival of athletics in the NT as being vested in clubs and centres. The future lies in grass roots athletics. A major thrust will be the development of club and centre support.

## ATHLETICS SOUTH AUSTRALIA

The past twelve months have been extremely busy and productive. The major events included:

- \* Hosting the 1992 Sugar Australian Track and Field Championships.
- \* Summit Meeting for Forward Planning.
- \* The Court Case re City of Burnside v Attorney General.
- \* A New "Schools" Club.
- \* Five S.A. athletes selected in the Olympic Team.
- \* The corporate business of Athletics S.A.

The profile of Athletics S.A. continues to increase. Our administration now has three aspects of our corporate business.

1. The Sport of Athletics.
2. Maintenance and hire of Olympic Sports Field.
3. Conference and Function Centre and Licensed Club.

### Competition

The summer athletics season of 1991/92 will go down as the most event packed and exciting season ever held in South Australia.

As well as the regular competition, All Schools, Interclub, Club Finals and Athletics SA Grand Prix and State Championships, Adelaide was host to the Annual Grand Prix Event - The Sugar Games and the National Championships which included the Mobil Grand Prix Finals and Trials for the 1992 Olympic Games and 1992 World Junior Championships.

Add to this the Australian Multi-Event Championships for Decathlon and Heptathlon, Australian Wheelchair Championships, National Trials for Intellectually Disabled and I.D. Games, Blind Sports National Championships, Police Games, various veteran meets, Little Athletics and interschool carnivals and the Olympic Sports Field has had only a couple of days rest in over four months.

\* South Australian athletes were successful at the National Titles held in 1991/92. 15 medals were won at the Open and U20 titles and 16 at the U16/U18 titles in Canberra. 62 young athletes attended the All Schools' Championships in Melbourne and were successful in winning 19 medals.

\* Athletics SA are proud of our five representatives in the 1992 Olympic Track and Field Team to compete in Barcelona in July/August. They are Sean Carlin (Hammer), Kathy Sambell (4 x 100m Relay), Dean Smith (Decathlon), Simon Arkell (Pole Vault) and Lisa Ondieki (Marathon).

Although the registered number of athletes/officials/coaches is still not increasing, we are encouraging many events for recreational athletes - City Bay Fun Run, Walk events, 10K Road Race, Schools Cross Country which involved 13,000 people.



In addition, 38,000 students and 3,000 other athletes use our track and field facilities during the period September/April. This puts 54,000 athletes from primary age through to veterans including all disability groups involved in our sport in South Australia.

The MARS programme has again been most successful with 263 schools participating and 22,000 students being part of this excellent skill development programme. The "All Schools" Club was a most successful initiative. Our State Coach and Development Officer held a two day Talent I.D. Weekend and from the several hundred attendees have launched a Development Squad programme in three tiers: Development Squad, Talent Squad, State Junior Squad. Athletics SA has appointed both Senior and Junior Event Coaches in all disciplines.

The major concern of the Board and Administration this year has been the legal battle for the future of O.S.F. The proceedings over the past twelve months and continuing have been a drain on resources, both human and financial. The uncertainty of the future facility and headquarters for our sport is unsettling.

All other aspects of the sport in South Australia are progressing in a positive and enthusiastic way and we look forward to an equally successful programme in the coming year.

The 1991/92 Athletic Year has again been one of steady progress for the Association. Highlights during the year include the inaugural Conference of QAAL, the agreement between the Association and the Queensland Academy of Sport to co-operate in the formation of a Track and Field High Performance Squad, the outstandingly successful Schools Knock Out Competition in Track and Field, the great effort of our All Schools Team in running a close second to N.S.W. at the Nationals, the successful conduct of the Australian Marathon Championship and the Brisbane Sugar Games and the selection of record numbers of Queensland athletes in the Olympic and World Junior Squads.

All Queensland State Championships again attracted good fields. For the first time, the State Age Championships were conducted outside of Brisbane and the Townsville Combined Athletic Clubs are to be congratulated of their efforts. A successful South Queensland Age Championship was held in Brisbane at the end of the season. Once again, the Association combined with the Queensland Secondary Schools Association to conduct a highly successful and high standard Queensland Secondary Schools Track and Field Championships. In Townsville, the Ross River Club again conducted a successful North Queensland Schoolboys' and Schoolgirls' Championships.

Despite the difficult economic times, State registrations have been maintained at a satisfactory level. However, it is incumbent on all of us to encourage more members to join our ranks. If a change of attitude and approach in some areas of our sport is required to achieve this, then such must be seriously considered. We must ensure that athletics moves with the times. We are in direct competition with a large number of sports all trying to encourage today's youth into their particular sport. Only those sports which are prepared to offer what the market place dictates will survive and prosper. We must ensure that Athletics is one of these. An interesting phenomena is the number of enquiries being received from Little Athletics Clubs seeking to have joint affiliation with the Q.A.A. The Association must encourage these clubs to join with us and assist with the transition from Little Athletics to Senior Athletics.

A very important innovation is the Secondary School Talent Identification Squad comprising the best secondary school athletes from throughout Queensland who will be brought to Brisbane for a special clinic during September. This is a positive move to encourage these athletes to continue in athletics with the Association and its clubs after they leave school.

1991/92 has been a difficult year financially. However, despite this, the Association has managed to record a reasonable result and to maintain its level of services to clubs and athletes. We are now investigating alternative means of raising funds including running events which bring in good revenue such as Half Marathon, special women's only events, school based events - both Cross Country and Track and Field - and so on.

Queensland Athletics must ensure that we take whatever steps are necessary to increase our membership, our public profile and our financial base. If we need to change our attitudes and our approach to some aspects of our Sport to achieve this, then so be it.

## ATHLETICS VICTORIA

Athletics Victoria celebrated one hundred years of organised competition in the 1991/92 season, with continued development and promotion of athletics throughout the state.

### **Administration**

During the year, there were a number of changes to staff. The office has undergone a complete refurbishment, now presenting a more efficient and professional image. The meeting/function room now provides excellent accommodation for a number of activities, and has been used for club social functions, entertaining VIP guests at championships, and even by the Federal Government in their launch of the National Campaign Against Drug Abuse. Strong ties have been maintained with other bodies, especially the Victorian Little Athletics Association and VICSRAPID. Emphasis has been placed on encouraging younger athletes to compete, via a dual membership programme with V.L.A.A., and on encouraging handicapped athletes to participate in our events via the Winter Challenge Series and the summer season Athletic Link Up programme. Both initiatives are progressing well.

### **Competitions**

The number of participants in winter events was pleasing, with graded competition for women, the unprecedented growth in popularity of winter walking, and the winter challenge series for intellectually disabled athletes all contributing to the success of the season.

In the summer season all grades, other than A-Grade, consisted of 14 rounds of competition. Interclub competition was conducted at 5 venues for men and 4 venues for women in the metropolitan region, and at the 5 Country regional Centres. The A-Grade competition for both men and women was held at Olympic Park on Thursday evenings and comprised 11 rounds of four-way matches. All matches were keenly contested and some excellent individual performances were recorded during the season.

The NEC meeting was again an excellent event, drawing the largest crowd seen at an athletics meeting in Victoria for many years. This meeting continues to grow, placing Victoria as the pinnacle event of the National Grand Prix Series.

### **Coaching Development**

The Junior Athletic Programme is now into its third year, and continues to develop, reaching an increasing number of children each year. The main features of the programme, the Clinic Contractor Scheme, the Junior Squad Programme, and the development of resources continue to be an outstanding success. A number of equally successful coaching clinics were held for athletes with an intellectual disability, as part of the Athletic Link Up Programme.

## **Development**

Athletics Victoria has continued to increase the profile of athletics in Victoria via a number of successful recruiting campaigns, displays and schemes. Continual maintenance of communication with schools, displays at Young Australia Expo and the Scienceworks Museum, and the Mars Five Star and newly introduced Athletics Victoria Athletic Achievement Award Schemes are all positive means of promoting participation in athletics.

## **Officials**

A.A. examinations have been held throughout the year, and the excellent results show that the officials do keep up to date with new rules and variations to existing rules. It was also evident throughout the season that many events had insufficient officials, and this problem needs to be addressed in order to ensure the smooth running fo future events.

## **General**

Three new clubs were formed in 1991/92. An operations manual for all clubs is currently being produced. Other projects underway relate to development and improvement of promotional materials and merchandise.

## **ATHLETES' COMMISSION**

Whilst the Athletes' Commission has not conducted a formal meeting during the past year, there has been quite a deal of activity and liaison between members; Simon Baker has maintained communication links with all members, as well as with Athletics Australia

However, it has become evident that the role of the Commission needs to encompass all facets of the sport, as well as having the involvement of all States.

During the next twelve months, the Commission plans to become truly representative for Australian athletes and, hopefully, attain Board representation through a democratic election system.

## **DOPING CONTROL COMMISSION**

Athletics Australia has continued to work closely with the IAAF and ASDA/ASC in the provision of appropriate anti-doping programmes.

In December, 1991, the A.S.C. and A.S.D.A. accepted a range of proposals from Athletics Australia to strengthen the ASDA Act and Regulations which were designed to limit the chance of loopholes arising, upon which athletes might be able to avoid liability.

Athletics Australia also played the co-ordinating role in designing a composite motion from the various proposals made to the 1991 I.A.A.F. Congress which led to the introduction of the four year penalty for major offences.

During the period of this report (1.04.1991 to 30.06.1992), three cases were dealt with by Athletics Australia, two resulting from refusals to provide a sample (one two year and one indefinite ban) and one three month ban from the use of an over the counter medication.

It is clear that the consequences of failing to agree to provide a sample at virtually any time, and also of using certain freely available medications are not fully understood by many athletes, and an even greater concentration on education on these and related issues is still required.

## COACHING CO-ORDINATING COMMITTEE

During the year four meetings were held.

The Committee continues to monitor the Athlete Development Programme administered by the National Coach, and the Coach Education Programme conducted by A.T. & F.C.A. through the Rothmans Foundation National Coaching Convenor. A report of athletes' enhancement and performance has been documented by the National Coach.

### Coach Accreditation Programme

Nearly thirty Level 0 and seventeen Level 1 Courses were conducted throughout the nation. These courses continue to service the "grass roots" coach who operates at Club or Little Athletic Centre Level. After a number of years of discussions with the Australian Athletic Confederation on ways to bring them to NCAS programmes, a special Level 1 Course was put on for their members.

Two National Level II Courses were conducted during the year. The first of these was conducted at QEII Stadium, Brisbane during September with eighteen coaches attending. The second course was held at A.I.S., Canberra during January with thirty-six coaches in attendance.

Nine coaches successfully completed their Level III development and assessment programme during the year - G. Bourne (HJ), L. Derby (LJ), S. Endean (Hurdles), T.Kerr (Hurdles), P. Le Rossignol (Steeplechase), J. MacDonald (Middle Distance), M. Reynolds (Hurdles) whilst T. Benson (Steeplechase) and J. Dufall (Hurdles) added a further event qualification to that already held.

A coach accreditation updating scheme was commenced, as required by the Australian Coaching Council of all N.C.A.S. sports.

### National Coaching Seminars

A very successful Hurdles Coaches' Conference was held at A.I.S. during November. The Conference was very ably directed by Craig Hilliard, Group Director for Hurdles and attended by 29 coaches from around the nation, together with 3 New Zealanders. The highly successful Finnish coach, Esa Peltola, was guest lecturer, sharing duties with Craig Hilliard, Roy Boyd and Garry Brown. Athletes John Caliguri and Kyle Van Der Kuyp gave valuable first hand insight into their own experiences, as well as ably demonstrating at a practical session.

A National Throws Coaches' Conference planned for April 1992 was postponed until September 1992, in an attempt to secure the services of a guest lecturer from overseas.

A four day Summer school programme of "Coaching the Female Athlete" was conducted at A.I.S. during January, at the same time as the Level II Course. The programme was led by Tudor Bidder and Marlene Mathews. Lecturers on a wide variety of topics included Margaret Mahony, Gaylene Clews, Nancy Atterton, Tony Benson, Dr. Dick Telford, Jackie Bymes, Merv Kemp, Mark Sayers, Warren McDonald, Craig Hilliard, Kerry Saxby, Phil King, Debbie Flintoff-King, Nicole Jeffery, Louise Burke, John Zanfirache, Daniela Costian,



Jane Flemming, Peter Stanton and Sue Baker-Finch. The very comprehensive programme was enjoyed by 29 coaches from around the nation.

A series of seminars on "Programming and Planning for Advanced Coaching" was held at Darwin, Perth and Melbourne with more than fifty coaches participating.

### **Teachers' Certificate**

This award, begun in 1990, continues to develop slowly. Queensland is the leader in putting on this course, that looks at the specifics of teaching athletics in the school education system. It was introduced because programmes for the community coach do not fully cover the needs of the teacher.

### **National Coaches' Conference**

The annual meeting of the National Event Coaches, Group Directors and Junior Group Directors was held at A.I.S. in October. The Conference gives these coaches a great opportunity to meet, to evaluate past programmes and refine future plans. This year, we were fortunate to have all National Track and Field Selectors present to give an insight into team programmes and selections.

### **Other activities included:**

- \* Continuation of the National Resources Co-Ordination activity under the direction of Jack Pross.
- \* Recommendations for coaches to Australian Teams by the President's Committee of A.T. & F.C.A.
- \* Review and refining of the National Coaching Accreditation Scheme.
- \* Study tours overseas by Jeff Clancy (Bulgaria) and Tony Benson (EACA Conference, Barcelona).
- \* Publication of "Long term training for Throwers" by Anatolie Bondarchuk (URS).
- \* Compiling and preparing a Level 0 Handbook.

The Committee records with thanks the very significant amounts of funding put into coach education and coach development programmes by the Australian Sports Commission and the Rothmans Foundation - National Sports Division.

## DISTANCE RUNNING COMMISSION

**MEETINGS:** The Commission had two meetings during the year of which one was funded by Athletics Australia.

**COURSE MEASURING:** Dave Cundy has run a number of seminars interstate for course measurers so that now there is a pool of A.A. accredited course measurers Australia wide. A distinctive A.A. certified accurate course logo is displayed by promoters of approved events with measured courses. This is considered to be an important factor in ensuring that the permit system for road events gets some teeth and status.

**PERMITS:** The distance calendar is crowded and it is therefore essential that the established events are protected from 'one off' promotions. The Commission is asked to adjudicate on permit applications which are contrary to the permit guidelines.

**SCHOOLS' CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS:** The duplication of the National Schools' Cross Country Championships still remains and we will continue to campaign for duplication elimination.

**SPONSORSHIP:** The Commission has a draft sponsorship package for a Distance Running Grand Prix. All we need now is a sponsor.

**CHAMPIONSHIPS:** The first Australian Mountain Running Championships were conducted in Canberra and subsequently a team was selected to contest the World Cup in Mountain Running in Italy.

The Commission has recommended a change to the point scoring systems for team championships.

We are concerned at the lack of support by states for the team events for some championships, particularly the road relays.

**INTERNATIONAL TEAMS:** The Commission is concerned at the number of international championships and the lack of substantial IAAF funding. This, together with the lack of depth in international standard athletes, has meant that we have had to decline competing in all the available events.

## INTERNATIONAL TOURS COMMISSION

The International Tours Commission began to fully establish itself within the role designated by the Board during 1991/92. A very extensive tours programme was designed and the necessary planning undertaken in association with the respective team managers.

Apart from the traditional championship event tours, the espoirs programme was expanded with two developmental tours to South East Asia for promising athletes who had not previously represented Australia overseas. These tours continue to provide a valuable introduction to international travel and competition and are helping to ensure that only the bare minimum of athletes will face major internationals without previous experience.

The Commission took on responsibility for recommending team management structures to the Executive, taking into consideration recommendations made by previous team managers and captains.

A women's relay tour was organised to North America in April 1991 with a view to qualifying a team for the World Championships, with a successful outcome. A men's tour followed in 1992.

Recommendations were made to the Board on a range of matters affecting teams.

One factor of concern is the lack of a team uniform sponsor, a matter which will be a high priority for the Commission in 1992/93.

The Commission was expanded to include coaching and athletes' representation and Peter Bowman assumed the Chair during the report period.

## OFFICIALS' COMMITTEE

A very productive meeting of the Committee was held during the National Championships in Adelaide, with only one apology - Denis Wilson (due to U16 and U18 Nationals). The committee discussed the format of officials' exams and resolved that these be changed by 'grouping' events - long/triple jumps, high jump/pole vault, shot/javelin, hammer/discus, starter/starter's assistants, finish judges, timekeepers and walk judges will combine umpire. We hope that this will give officials more opportunity to be graded in more events.

New grading cards have been designed and the AA Officials' Hand Book was finalised and due for release later this year. The Officials' Committee is indebted to Flo Wrighter for the work she did in preparing this book and the Australian Sports Commission for funding.

The Committee expresses their condolences to families of officials who passed away during the past year, their contribution to athletics in Australia will be greatly missed.

South Australians were very thankful for the support given by interstate officials at the nationals in March. Wouldn't it be wonderful if sponsorship could be gained so that more officials could visit States during National Championships.

On behalf of the Officials' Committee, I thank Athletics Australia for their continued support and to all officials, sincere thanks for their untiring work. We are all volunteers and love our sport, Athletics, and perhaps one day Australia will win a Commonwealth, Olympic Games or a World Championship where we can 'adopt' the Barcelona motto "Friends for Life" as we have made many wonderful friends through athletics.

## **TECHNICAL COMMITTEE**

As requested by the Track and Field Commission, I contacted each of the Member Associations regarding the Commission's recommendation that all tracks be surveyed to allow use of the split start in the 3000m and 5000m events where appropriate.

As a result from the Junior Development Commission regarding the alteration to the rules relating to junior weights, enquiries elicited the fact that a decision had been made to delay the introduction of the rule change to a later date. The Technical Committee members were informed about this postponement.

On behalf of the members of the Technical Committee, I would like to thank the Board for the opportunity for the three of us to serve on this committee.

## **WOMEN'S COMMITTEE**

The latter question has now been resolved by the Medical Commission of the IAAF. I was privileged to attend a seminar in Sydney in July at which the Australian Sports Commission outlined the government's policy for the implementation of the Equality for Women in Sport. There will need to be a great deal of effort concentrated on bringing more women into our sport, particularly in the areas of coaching and administration.

## SELECTION COMMITTEES

Both Selection Committees continued to shoulder a greatly increased workload in 1991/92 with a significant rise in the number of international competition opportunities available to Australian athletes both in teams and as invited individuals.

Amongst the senior team results during this report period were a win to the men's road racing team (Lloyd, Higgins, Norwood, Arthur, Moneghetti) in the Chiba International Ekiden, a silver medal to Simon Baker in the 50km event at the World Walking Cup and a sixth placing to Steve Moneghetti in a fiercely contested World Cross Country Championship.

A generally successful selection policy and process was applied for the World Track and Field Championships with the majority of the team selected after the National Championships, but with the opportunity for late selection. A pre-departure system of performance trials was successfully trialled.

The Championships results were, whilst not containing any medals, quite satisfactory for a relatively young and inexperienced team. Six top eight placings were the highlight, including a pleasing climax to the year's relay programme for the women's 4 x 100 metres team.

Athletics Australia continued to assist other organisations in the selection of teams, including A.U.S.A. for the World Student Games Team which won four medals, including golds to Shaun Creighton (steeple) and Alison Inverarity (high jump) and for the World Student Games Cross Country at which Creighton won the men's event, for the Intellectually Disabled Section of the Paralympics Team, and A.U.R.A. for the World 100km Cup.

The Selection Committees were also given the responsibility of selecting National Squads, a role which did not fully develop during the report period. A full review of the Squad system was left until after the completion of the four year Olympic planning period.

A highly talented and successful elite junior team was selected to compete in the United States. A full junior team was chosen to tour New Zealand as a replacement for the cancelled junior international which was scheduled for Brisbane in October 1991.

The commitment and hard work of my fellow selectors, Pam Turney, Peter Hamilton and Rod Gibb is appropriately acknowledged here, as is the invaluable assistance supplied by our Statistician, Paul Jenes, and his junior assistant, David Tarbotton.

A full set of Australian performances in international competitions for which teams or individuals were selected is included within the 1991/2 Almanac of Results.

## WALKING COMMITTEE

The committee met on four occasions and had numerous telephone hook-ups during the year.

\* After consulting with State Bodies, the Walking Federation and the AIS, we recommended dates for the Australian titles and championship fixtures.

\* The inclusion of a women's 10km walk at the Barcelona Olympics created an increase in the number of participants in this event, with many young athletes moving up to the distance, and giving older athletes an incentive to remain longer in the sport. There were 19 women under 50 minutes (the old 1990 Commonwealth Games qualifying time) this year.

\* The committee has encouraged more Walking Clubs to support the certified marking course exams held by Dave Cundy for A.A. and have pointed out that all state and national titles have to be held on a certified course.

\* The committee is still trying to convince the State Walking Clubs to tap into the increasing number of power walkers around Australia, which could boost membership.

There is a huge potential to increase our number - as there are hundreds of these people paying between \$5 and \$6 to join an hour power walking session organised by gymnasiums.

ACT Athletics has introduced a Power Walk with the 4km Fun Run at the end of the Interclub programme each week. We are trying to encourage other states to follow up this idea. At the recent Gold Coast Marathon, there were 874 walkers who completed the 10km walking section.

We would like to acknowledge the co-operation with Athletics Australia's office and staff during the year.

During the financial period grants totalling \$0 were made and the balance of the fund at 30th June, 1992 is \$8,176.

## (b) R.W. Clarke Foundation

Income from this fund is used to assist athletes to obtain overseas competitive experience between the World Track and Field Championships, Olympic and Commonwealth Games. During the financial period grants totalling \$200 were made and the balance of the fund at 30th June, 1992 is \$88,661.

## (c) Athletes Trust Account

From time to time Athletics Australia receives money in respect of certain athletes as permitted under the Rules of the Constitution of the International Amateur Athletic Federation. These monies are kept separate from the Union funds and are deposited to a separate trust account. These funds can be applied to the provision of assistance to the athlete in compliance with the Rules of the Constitution of the International Amateur Athletic Federation. The total funds held on behalf of athletes at 30th June, 1992 was \$195,360.

Summary of Income and Expenditure Statements for the 15 months ended 30 June 1992 are attached. The net surplus transferred to Accumulated Funds was \$74,752 (12 month period ended 31 March 1991 - \$94,091).

An amount of \$80,000 was transferred from Accumulated Funds specifically to provide funds for the new premises.

A summary of the movement in the Accumulated Funds Account is set out on page 2.

Income for the 15 month period was \$741,527 (12 month period ended 31 March 1991 - \$512,981). A summarised Income Statement is attached (page 3). Expenditure for the 15 month period was \$666,775 (12 month period ended 31 March 1991 - \$418,890). A detailed Expenditure Statement is attached at pages 4 & 5.

Amounts held in provision and project accounts representing funds available for specific provisions, new premises and projects total \$812,373 (31 March 1991 - \$826,215). Details of movement in staff provisions and balances of provision and project accounts are set out on pages 6 and 7.

A summary of funds held and receivable as at 30 June 1992 is shown on page 8.

I also include the proposed budget for the Financial year to 30 June 1993 with comparison to actual and budgets for the Financial year to 30 June 1992 (15 months) and actuals for Financial year to 30 June 1991, Pages 9 to 11.
