The Twenty-third Report and Financial Statement of the Australian Women's Amateur Athletic Union is presented for your consideration.

This Conference and the current National Championships culminate another year of "highs" and "lows" — "nothing is ever perfect and nothing is so low that it does not have its peaks".

We trust the lows are past, and peaks were reached by the performances of our women athletes at the 1973 Pacific Conference Games in Canada last July and the British Commonwealth Games just concluded at Christchurch, New . Zealand.

It is particularly gratifying to note the depth of youth included in both teams, whom, we trust, will continue their active interest for the future benefit of our sport at State, National and International levels.

Congratulations to both our administrative officers of the International teams and the best wishes of the Union is extended to the South Australian Women's  $A_{\bullet}A_{\bullet}A_{\bullet}$  for a successful 1974 Australian Women's Track and Field Championships.

#### AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS \_ HOBART, 1973.

The organisation of the Championships began early in May 1972. Our Association knew that we would be confronted with many problems especially in connection with the North Hobert ground. These anomolies had been pointed out to the States at our Conference of the Australian Momen's Amateur Athletic Union, held in Perth, but in spite of these disadvantages we were still given the privilege and honour to conduct these Championships.

Oirculars were forwarded to all States enclosing lay-out of ground with the rise andfall, details of circular track, lanes etc., in order that no State would arrive in Hobart without some knowledge of what type of ground they would be competing on, as everyone was aware that the ground did not conform to I.A.A.F. standards.

All teams had arrived by Wednesday 28th February, and everything was in readiness for the commencement of the Junior and Senior Pentathlon, plus heats of various events.

The first day of the Championships was marred by cold, wet weather and much criticism from Press, and visiting States was heard about the conditions of the ground.

Despite the short comings of the ground no critisism can be levelled at the Hobart City Council who did all in their power to see that the surface of the oval was in perfect condition.

As it was a long week-end and facilities for meals in Hobart limited, our Association decided to supply a luncheon for all local and visiting officials.

On Saturday 3rd Mcrch, all teams paraded in uniforms,

together with Officials in readiness for the Official Opening Ceremony which was performed by Lady Bastyan, Patroness of the Association, who was accompanied on to the arena by the President of the Australian Women's Amateur Athletic Union, Mrs. Mabel Robinson, and Mrs. June Bowring, President of the Tasmanian Association.

Ruth Squibb recited the oath of amateurism on behalf of all competitors. At the conclusion of the formalities, Official guests were entertained at an afternoon tea.

Competition on the second and final day was most outstanding with many good performances being recorded, and the Tasmanian Record Book was almost re-written.

Despite the criticism from one of the athletes about the track, her best ever time of 22.5seconds in the 200 metres, only 0.1 seconds outside the World Record, was recorded.

Tasmania was delighted with the performance of their Junior, Penny Gray who won a silver medal in the 1500 metres, and a bronze medal in the 800 metres. The Junior Relay Team was third in this event.

Victoria won the Doris Mulcahy Shield and New South Wales the Doris Magee Shield.

A Buffet dinner for Union Officials, interstate Officials and Team Managerosses was held at Hathway House, and a Finale Supper Dance was held for Athletes, Officials and Visitors at Hadley's Hotel.

A bus trip to Richmond was arranged for officials and visitors, and was followed by a buffet tea at the home of our independent delegate.

Mrs. Mabel Robinson, President of the Australian Women's Amateur Athletic Union proclaimed the Championships closed and Invited all to meet in Adelaide for the 1974 Championships.

We are most grateful and appreciative to the Officials from New South Wales and Victoria for their assistance in helping to stage the Australian Championships, for without their help it would not have been possible to conduct these National Titles.

Special mention must be made to our Liaison Officers who worked tirelessly during the Championships looking after the visiting Teams, and to the officials of the Tasmanian Amateur Athletic Association for their help.

We extend our sincere thanks to the athletes for their first class competition, to State Mageresses for their co-operation and all who helped to make the Championships a success.

Our Association is pleased to report that the Hobart City Council have plans well in hand for the construction of a synthetic track at the Athletic Centre.

Indications are that by the time the roster has been made for the Australian Championships, the Centre will have been completed and Tasmania will be in a position to offer an athletic track comparable to any in Australia, and at last our State will be in a position to meet the track standards of other States.

# 1973 AUSTRALIAN CROSS COUNTRY, ROAD RELAYS and ROAD WALKS SHAMPICNSHIPS

The 1973 Gross Country, Road Relay and Road Walks Championships were conducted on behalf of the Australian Women's Amateur Athletic Union, by the Victorian Momen's Amateur Athletic Association, in the grounds of the Christian Brothers College, Bundoorn, approximately 12 miles from Melbourne on Saturday and Sunday, August 25th & 25th, 1973.

The Opening Geremony was performed by Lady Connelly, Patroness of the Victorian Association.

The excellent facilities available plus beautiful weather unusual for Melbourne at this time of year, was the introduction to a week end of good competition.

All States were delighted to welcome Western Australia, the first time the girls from the West had participated in the Cross Country Championships. It is necessary to record in this Report the distress of several competitors in each section of the Cross Country Championships, a matter subjected to considerable criticism; such sights of obvious distress would eliminate any suggestion in the extension of distances in these events for women.

However, the overall competition was of a high standard as the results indicate.

At the conclusion of the events on the second day, Mrs. Mabel Robinson, President of the A.W.A.A.U. presented the various trophies, declared the 1973 Championships closed and issued an invitation to all States to be represented at the 1974 Championships to be held in South Australia.

We record our appreciation to all teams for their support and sportsmanship. To our own Officials and Social Committee thank you for a splended effort.

Report

Team Personnel: Mr. G. Origgs, General Manager; Dr. B. Warr, Assistant Manager; Mrs. M. Cahill, Assistant Manager-Homen; Mr. L. Gurnow, Delegate; Mr. J. Pross, Co-ordinator of training. --- Charlene Rendina, Captain; Raelene Boye; Petra Rivers; Jane Keen; Erica Nixon; Jennifer Symon; Judith Canty, Angela Cook; Gaye Dell, Denise Robertson; Lynette Tillett and 24 male athletes.

Assembly: The entire team assembled in Sydney on Wednesday, June 20th at the Maroubra Lodge Motel. Wednesday evening was spent distributing uniforms and general outfitting.

UNIFORMS: Thursday was fully spent altering the women's travelling and walking out uniforms. It was unfortunate that the uniforms could not be made in Victoria or by a major firm. I was notified that material could not be obtained in Melbourne and I had less than six weeks to obtain material and arrange for the making in South Australia. Made of Polyester Gaberdine, the white dress and jacket with green and gold trimming and the travelling outfit of green slacks and battle jacket with white and gold trimming was smart and practical, but unfortunately a bad fit and most dresses and slacks had to be altered.

We were able to borrow three sewing machines and the team worked solidly to make the necessary alterations. Special thanks is extended to Angela Cook's mother for her help and co-operation. More consideration must be given to the type of shoes for the team. The shoes donated by Footrest do not seem to fit the athletes feet and by the time we reached Toronto the girls found them uncomfortable and unsuitable to the climate. White sandals were purchased for the members who did not have white shoes and these proved suitable.

Opparture: The team left Sydney on June 22, and the flight although a little tiring was excellent and the team arrived in Vancouver in high spirits.

Arrival Vancouver: The team spent the day at the Hyatt House Motel, a magnificent building. Lyn Tillett was suffering from a cold and Fetra Rivers was treated by Dr. Marr for a slight infection.

<u>Iraining:</u> Some of the team trained at Vancouver, but most of them spent the day sleeping.

FORCHTO: We arrived in Toronto early on Saturday, June 23rd and were transported by coaches to the Victoria College, Toronto.

Accommodation: The team was accommodated at the Margaret Addison Hall and was excellent. A recreation room was in the basement and therapy rooms available. Fresh fruit and drinks were available at all times and facilities for laundry and transport excellent.

Meals: All meals were available at the University and although steaks were not available athletes were well catered for.

Entertainment: A reception was held at the home of the Consul General of USA, Mr. J.S. Henderson and we were amazed that most of the guests did not know anything about the Games. The Australian Team was entertained at the home of the Australian High Commissioner on June 26. Tours to the Niagara Falls were enjoyed by all teams. A farewell Reception was held at Etobicoke at the conclusion of the Games. This function was in the form of a Smorgasbord dinner and was a fitting finale.

<u>Training</u>: Training was provided for athletes wishing to train at the Etopicoke Stadium, 23 miles from Toronto.

Track: Athletes found the Grasstex track hard but the women adjusted well to the surface. The long jump runway of Chevron 440 was excellent. The javelin runway was grass and raised above the track and this proved a little upsetting to the throwers.

Meet: Lack of publicity throughout Toronto and the fact that bookings could only be made out at the stadium could have accounted for the stadium not being filled to a capacity. Rain fell prior to the meeting but ceased during competition.

<u>Porformances</u>: Pre-meet competition is necessary and if this had been available performances would have been higher especially from the athletes having their first international competition.

Long Jump: This was the first event to be contested with Lynette Tillett, Erica Nixon and Martha Watson (USA) dominsting

and all taking the lead during competition. The event was drawn out and through the slowness of the officials, athletes were unnecessarily delayed between junps.

Martha Matson won the event with a Games record of 6.37m. Lynette Tillett second (6.34m) and Erica Nixon third (6.28m) Both Lyn and Erica broke the existing Games record.

100m. Hurdles: Gayo Dell won the 1st semi-final in 14.1s and in the final improved her time to 14.0s to gain second.

100 Metres: Raclene Doyle and Denise Robertson ran 11.9s in their semi-finals to enter the final. The final was one of the highlights of the neeting with Raelene defeating W. Brown (NZ) and Denise in third position. The first four placings were timed at 11.0s and the fifth placing on 11.9.

200 Metres: Ractone won the 1st semi-final in 24.2s and Denise the 2nd in 24.0s. The final was again close with Jenise gaining 1st place in 23.6s a Games record and Raelene in 2nd position on 23.7s

460 Metres: Judy Canty and Charlenc Rendina dominated the field to take first and second placings in 52.9s, a Games and Canadian Open Record.

800 Metres: Angela Cook ran 2:07.6 for fourth position in the first semi-final and Charlene Rendina 3rd position in the 2rd semi-final in 2:00.9. The final went to the outstanding USA athlete, Mary Decker in 2:05.1 with Charlene Rendina second at 2:05.2.

1500 Metres: Angela Cook finished 4th in 4:19.8 and it was only inexperience that kept Angela from recording a higher performance.

4 x 100m Relay: A magnificent team effort from Lynette Tillett, Denise Robertson, Gaye Dell and Raelene Boyle. Raelene running the last leg of the relay was feeling the strain of her injured leg and she ran one of her most determined races of her career to uphold the great teamwork and to gain the gold medal with Canada recording the same time of 45.3s for second place.

Shot put: Jane Keen was upset by inexperience and did not attain her usual standard. Her first throw was 12.31m and she failed to improve and finished in 6th position.

Discus: Jame Keen recorded 44.60m for 4th position.

<u>Javelin</u>: Petra Rivers and Jennifer Symon finished in 6th and 5th positions. Petra still being effected by her infection and Jenny nursing an Injured muscle.

Departure - Saturday 30th: The Australian Team divided into two sections with Mr. Origgs and Mr. Pross accompanying one team to Ottowa and Montreal and Dr. Warr and myself in charge of the remainder at Sask toon.

<u>Renarks</u>: The team adjusting well and working as a happy team. Wale athletes helping with training and encouragement. With both the nale and female athletes being housed in the one building we found that all members were more settled and content to make use of the recreation facilities provided in the building.

SASKATION - Satellite Meeting July 3rd: Teams accommodated at the University of Saskatchewan in C bedroom suites with kitchen, lounge and tathroom. Suites were excellent but no crockery or kitchen utensiles were provided and as the dining hall was one nile away this did not prove satisfactory. We requested hot water jug or kettle but after we arrived we found that we had to fend for ourselves.

<u>Track:</u> Unusual rain made the cinder track a quagmire and training was conducted under difficult conditions. The below standard of the track lowered the morale of the team but at no time did the girls express their disappointment outside our rooms and when the competition commenced gave their utmost effort.

Entertainment: A day tour to Pike Lake was enjoyed and proved relaxing. Dinner was delayed until the end of the meeting on July 3rd and a steak dinner was enjoyed by all athletes but no entertainment was provided.

400 Metres: Gharlene Rendina ran strongly to win in 54.4seconds

100 Metres: Denise Robertson had a narrow victory over M. Bailey (Ganada) in 11.7s

800 Mictres: Charlene made the mistake of keeping to the back of the field and when she made her finishing run found the short straight a down fall. Charlene gained a valuable lesson which she applied in further competition. Third position in 2:07.3.

200 Metres: Denise Robertson 1st in 23.8s

4 x 100m Relay: Australia (Nixon, Rendina, Robertson) combined with New Zealand (M. Drown) to run second in 46.7s to USA... Vancouver - 1st 46.3s.

Long Jumps Runway well below standard, Erica Nixon 4th 6.02m.

<u>Javelin</u>: Runway not mowed and Jennifer Symon found the javelin hard to control and could only record two throws that were not fouled. Her throw of 44.46m gained second position.

High Jumps Only two competitors competed under shocking conditions. Jenny Symon jumped 1.63m with Patty Wilson winning at 1.66.

REMARKS: Lack of publicity and communication lowered the morale of all teams. The general attitude was that the Satellite meeting was handled by a few officials and did not have the backing of the community. It was only the friendship between all competing athletes that made the meeting worthwhile.

Our 1973/4 Track and Field Season went back to the former Interclub Competition i.e. on a club against club basis. Last season we tried a system of grading athletes in events according to performances but when a vote was taken from the athletes at the conclusion of the season they voted against this form of competition as it lacked club spirit.

We held our A to G Grade competition on the Sydney Sports Ground, with the H to M Grades being held on six suburban grounds. There seemed to be a lack of enthusiasm with our athletes this year and, although not considered high, many did not reach the qualifying grade standards set.

In addition to our Saturday competition we held fortnightly Thursday twilight meetings for selected athletes on the new Tart: n track at the Hensley Athletic Field. At these meetin s we held, for all competitors, the 3000 metres, which proved very popular particularly with the younger age group, and the 400 metres Hurdles, with only three girls interested in this event.

Our Coaching clinics to country areas were again held, and were extremely well attended, resulting in a rise in the number of entries for our Country Championships.

Our membership has decreased, and we now have 222 seniors, 419 juniors, 1336 sub-juniors and 347 officials, totalling 2321 members. In addition to this we have 329 juveniles. Our Glubs total 32 Metropolitan, 41 Country

with 4 Country Dranch Associations. We also have three specialised Walkers clubs, and one Throwers club.

We conducted our Winter cross country competition each Gaturday from May to August, using six different courses, and had good attendances. We congratulate the Victorian Association on the way they conducted the 1973 Australian Cross Country, Road Walks and Road Relay Championships, the venue was delightful.

We compliment the Tasmanian Association on the staging of the 1973 Championships, and extend to the South Australian Association our Best Mishes for the success of the 1974 Championships.

A small government grant for Toronto helped to make it possible to raise that finance, but other functions arranged did not get the support of all and both bodies made up the deficit out of funds.

We are now looking forward to 1975, when the Track and Field Games Championships will be held in Grisbane and have been allocated the Lang Park Oval for 5th, 6th, 8th and 9th March 1975.

Best of luck is recorded to all members of the Australian BeSe Games Team for their success in Christchurch.

To South Australia, who will be conducting both the Track and Field and Gross Country 1974, we wish you two very successful meetings.

#### SOUTH AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S ATATEUR ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The 1972/74 season is proving to be for South Australia, one of unusual activity, enterprise, progress and change.

Continuing the trend of previous years, we again report an increase in the number of entries for the 1973 State Primary and Secondary Schoolgiris' Championships which for the first time were both conducted at the Olympic Sports Field. This increased interest is evidenced by the fact that from 1963 to 1973, numbers of entries swelled from 315 to 4,796 (\*1,422.53) events conducted rose from 21 to 102 (\*385.73) while the number of schools participating increased from 25 to 129 (\*4165).

Inter-Club competition thus far has not produced many startling performances and our largest registrations are again in the sub-junior and juvenile ranks.

For the first time, the Momen's Association have printed their own Informtation Handbook, instead of the traditionally combined Men's/Momen's Year Book. This has fortunately been successful financially, as well as, being an even more invaluable source of information for athletes and officials alike.

Administrative communications have been greatly enhanced owing to the erection of an Association Office on the southern mound of the Olympic Sports Field, the venue for all our Inter-Club competition. We are extremely fortunate in that our relationship with the Men's Association is more than amicable, and when the Official's Room,

between the Men's and Women's Offices, is completed administrative operations will be at peak efficiency.

One innovation approved by Gouncil which is proving increasingly popular among the athletes are "polls" conducted to ascertain the majority wish of the competitors in matters which directly concern them. This, coupled with the circulation of a newsletter titled "The Athletes' Footnote", is greatly facilitating relationships between "The Administration" and "The Competitors", who sometimes voice disapproval of decisions made on their tehalf. Gouncil strictly adheres to the majority vote.

Our sincere congratulations go to all Commonwealth Games Team members - we wish then every success. We are naturally proud of our own Jenny Symon, whose future in athletics seems well assured.

We have a very busy year ahead of us as Host State for both the Australian Momen's Track and Field and Gross Country Championships. We are looking forward to renewing old acquaintances, making new ones and conducting very successful meetings.

We all extend our thanks in recognition of Mrs. Margaret CARLLL'S years as Monorary Secretary of the S.A.M.A.h.A. Without doubt, her years of service have done much to advance our sport.

In closing, I would be most remiss if I did not acknowledge the guidance and assistance of our President, Mrs. Wendy M. EY, our Non. Treasurer/Registrar, Mrs. Noreen W. SHEPHERD and our Assistant Hon. Secretary, Miss Christine M. HALES. Their patience and understanding have been incalculable benefit to me.

Deing my first Annual Report, mention is warranted of the invaluable co-operation of our close-knit Executive, an Executive that has a fine understanding and realistic approach to the welfare, promotion and furtherance of athletics in this State.

(2) Are perhaps these youngsters, after hard and possibly forced exploitation of their talents, at the age of twelve, bedoming bored and seeking other less exacting interests? (3) Will this eventually be encountered in all States?

Unlike swimmers, who reach their peak in their very early "teens", statistics have adequately proved that track and particularly field are adult sports and international titles won and records achieved at a more mature age.

Owing to different circumstances existing in each State, this is obviously a matter requiring serious consideration by Constituent Associations.
