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Our Twenty-seventh Annual Report and Financial Statement is presented for your consideration.

The achievements of our athletes over the year are listed in the following pages.

Equally important, at administrative level, the situation was amicably resolved at a joint meeting between the two Australian Unions at Mclbourne last January, following some years of unnecessary pin-prickings in respect to "amalgamation" on the part of various State Associations.

it appears almost certain that a standing committee of the two Unions, to be known as the Australian Amateur Athletic Board, will be appointed to formulate policy for the development of Amateur Athletics in Australia.

The Doard will meet annually, or more often if required and submit reports and recommendations to the respective Unions forthwith, after its meeting.

Each affiliated Association shall elect one member to the Board and a Chairman shall be elected from its members who shall only exercise a deliberative vote.

It is interesting to record in 1977 that the equality of men and women was clearly stated in the Dible, Galatians, 3-28-"There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female, for ye are all one —.".

Our acceptance on an equal basis is gratifying and undoubtedly we will contribute with renewed enthusiasm to aid the development of our sport in Australia.

REGISTRATIONS

We are pleased to report an increase in registrations for the current season in all States except Tasmania, which, however, still maintains its fourth place in overall registrations.

AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS _ MELBOURNE 1976

The combined men's and women's Track and Field Championships were held for the second time in 43 years - the last time being at Perth in 1972. The Championships, held at Olympic Park from March 18 to 21, were an outstanding success.

ORGANIZATION

The organization of the Championships was the responsibility of the Executive Committee of the Victorian Women's Amateur Athletic Association and the Victorian Amateur Athletic Association. Much time and thought was necessary in the planning of the Titles. The

combined Victorian State Titles were hold a short time prior to the Nationals; this was a good dress rehearsal for the Australian Championships and several alterations were made to improve the presentation of this major competition.

SPONSORSHIP:

The Commonwealth Banking Corporation sponsored the Championships and we are most grateful for this support. They provided headed typing paper, competition numbers, folders and posters for advertising. Several satchels were supplied to interstate Delegates. They organized a Cocktail Party for the Press. Our respective Associations compiled a folder for each Press representative. This contained information regarding all teams - where accommodated, Manager's name together with personnel and performances of the top athletes in each team. This pre-arrival information was much appreciated.

The Bank was responsible for a further Cocktail Party for the announcement of the Athletic Team to represent at the Montreal Olympic Games.

PUBLICITY:

We are of the firm opinion that the Press Cocktail Party was, in many ways, responsible for the excellent Press before and during the events. Action pictures appeared in the Press daily and we thank all members of the media for their support.

TEA MS :

All teams were met on arrival, introduced to their liaison officers and presented with a box of fruit. Training was available at Olympic Park and Yarra Park. A meeting of Team Managers was held at the Amateur Sports Club. There, Arema and Technical Managers gave details of the forthcoming four days of competition.

COMPETITION,

Mrs. Mabel Robinson, M.D.E., President of the Women's Union declared the Championships open on the Thursday morning. The contribution of our women athletes to the Championships played a great part in their success. Added excitement to the Meet was the knowledge, by all athletes, that this would be the last opportunity to perform before the Australian Selection Committee panel.

We pay a warm tribute to our Interstate Sirls, who, together with our own State representatives, were responsible for one Commonwcalth, Fifteen Australian, and thirty-two Victorian records. This must be an outstanding achievement

in the history of women's athletics in Australia.

Yes! Our girls certainly played their part in what has been claimed a 'great Championship'.

The President of the Amateur Athletic Union of Australia, Mr. C.R. Aitken, C.B.E., accompanied by our President, Mabel Robinson, welcomed the Governor-General of Australia, Sir John Kerr, K.C.M.G., K.St.J., Q.C., and Lady Kerr to the Championships on the Saturday afternoon.

OFFICIALS:

The Officials Committee of each Association selected Officials for the four days of competition. They worked throughout the Championships on a 50/50 basis. Many compliments were received for the highly efficient manner in which they carried out their duties.

GENERA L

Complete results of each days events were available to State Secretaries, Team Managers and members of the Australian Selection Committee.

Light refreshments were provided for Officials throughout each day. We will always be grateful to those Officials who worked 'behind the scenes'.

Mrs. Robinson presented the Doris Mulcahy Shield to Victoria - most wins Open Championships; Doris Magee Shield to Queensland - most wins Junior Championships.

We record our appreciation to all States for their cooperation throughout the Championships.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

If combined Championships are to be held in the future, we feel it is necessary to review the 'Order of Events'. The printed programmé was compiled by the Amateur Athletic Union of Australia. We suggest if this is to be the pattern in the future, programmes designate Record Holders at the heading of each event.

We feel more "colour" can be introduced to the Opening and Closing Coremonies. It was surprising the number of people who expressed their disappointment because the "girls did not march".

REPORT OF WOMEN'S TEAM _ OLYMPIC GALLES 1976

After a rather long and tiring trip, we arrived at the village shortly after midnight and finally into our quarters by about 2.00 am. Our apartment was good compared with some of the other rooms but still quite crowded for the tense moments that built up during competition.

The lack of privacy was the major inconvenience, as most athletes prefer to be alone while competing under pressure. There were four bedrooms shared by two and three people, and three of the girls had to sleep in the lounge which was also the T.V. and Kitchen area. Two toilets and showers amongst thirteen women was hardly enough and often there was a queue up.

The security in the village was to be commended and although some may have thought it was overdone, the thought of Munich's tradedy made them realise the necessity for their strictness.

The food was excellent and one could hardly say they went hungry as the cafeteria was open 24 hours with fresh salads, fruit and hot meals always available.

The pre-games meetings in Canada were successful but without European entries the competition was dominated by Australians who desperately needed the races.

Considering Australia was out of season with the rest of the world, most athletes performed above themselves, and those who didn't were not to be disgraced, for three meetings since March is hardly enough competition to peak for an Olympic Games.

The Team called a meeting with the Manager, Manageress, and Coaches to discuss the future of Australian Track and Field, this report will be forwarded to the Union by the Manager, Graeme Briggs.

The team was not the happiest of teams that I have been a member of, but I feel our living conditions could have been the reason for some of the incidents that arose.

In conclusion ! thank the selectors for electing me as Captain, indeed a great honour.

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NEW SOUTH WALES WOMEN'S A MATEUR ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The 1976/77 year started with the usual winter cross country competition which was conducted during the months of May, June and July on five different courses. The attendance of athletes was very good, and the officials are to be complimented on the running of this competition under cold and wet conditions.

Interclub competition was again conducted in Grades. The "Major A" grade was retained with the selected athletes having the choice of competing in Major A or in a lower grade for their club. Surprisingly the majority of topliners preferred to compete for their Club, and this reduced the standard of our Major A grade.

In addition to the Sports Ground, interclub competition was held on five suburban grounds, two of these being combined with the Men. The idea of suburban grounds, so that competition can be taken to the athletes, is a good one but it is sometimes difficult to get a sufficient number of clubs on the ground to make the competition interesting for the athletes.

As the Government is anxious that any submissions for assistance should be channelled through one body, the formation of an Athletic Doard is in progress in our State. The Doard would discuss the development, sponsorship and Government assistance for athletes, with each Association retaining its own autonomy.

With members of the N.S.W. Men's Association, we conducted week-end visits to many country àreas to give instruction to club officials on administration and each section of track and field. The country people are most anxious to gain all the knowledge that they can, and their enthusiasm was clearly shown by the number of questions asked.

The Coaching Clinics which have been sponsored by the Shell Company for so many years were again conducted. These are always well received and well attended by country officials and athletes, and the athletes benefit greatly from the personal coaching of topline coaches whilst the officials learn a lot about coaching that they can pass on.

Registrations have increased, and in addition to the 2663 members listed in the A.W.A.A. Union Report we have 352 juveniles under 11 years, making a total of 3015 members. We also have 31 male technical officials. At present we have 28 city clubs and 42 country clubs. Our 5 Branches provide interclub competition for the country clubs.

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To the South Australian $W_{\bullet,h,h,h}$ - congratulations on the very successful running of the 1976 Australian Cross-Country/ Road Walks/Road Relay Championships, and sincere thanks for the hospitality extended to purteam members, this is very much appreciated.

We welcome the visiting officers and athletes from other States to our City, and hope that they will enjoy the 1977 Australian Track & Field Championships.

QUEENSLAND WOMEN'S ANY TEUR ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Firstly we must say congratulations to the three women athletes who were chosen for the Montreal Olympics. Denise Robertson who ran herself into the 200 metres final and was a member of the Australian 4 x 100 metres Relay team which also made the final. Darbara Wilson was also a relay member, and Susan Jowett, who is a registered Queensland athlete, but was chosen for the Country of her birth, New Zealand. We are really proud to have had these three athletes in Montreal, and we are becoming really optimistic, with the talent which we have at present, that further women athletes will be chosen in future Australian Teams.

Cross_Country both on a State and School level has been really successful, and the commadeship and competition which it provided augurs well for the next winter competition.

Schoolgirls Track and Field entries a restill increasing, and this season's events were held at the Mount Gravatt complex. Many more young athletes were recruited, due mainly to the aftermath of Olympic Games fever. This happens most Olympic or Commonwealth Games years.

An overall registration of 722 athletes and Officials has been a delight to our Council members. During the season 58 Seniors; 143 Juniors; 422 Sub-Juniors and 99 Officials have been registered in Metropolitan and Country areas.

The annual Sub-Junior Interstate Match has proved a great incentive to the youn; sters and maybe it could become a Championship meeting at a later time.

Queensland is still conducting its graded interclub competition and we feel that this competition is proving to most of our younger athletes, that the better competition does improve their own standard of performances. It is likely that some of the higher grades will be raised to cope with the ever improving performances of some of the youngsters.

With the staging of the Sydney Games and a team being invited to New Zealand in January, the Melbourne Games to be held in February, Australian Championships and an Australian v New Zealand, our athletes will be able to get more vital competition with overseas stars.

This season our own State titles will not be held until after the Australian Championships in Sydney. This was unavoidable with the combined competition at Mount Gravatt.

Congratulations are offered to New South Wales for a successful Track and Field Championships and for the coming Cross Country in August. Best of luck to your Association.

SOUTH AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S AMATEUR ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

More athletes particularly those in the younger age groups are developing interest in Gross Country running. Most of the Sub-Junior girls involved appear to have come from districts where Little athletics members are encouraged to join senior clubs for winter running.

The Cross Country Championships, hosted by South Australia in 1976 were most successful, although as usual "the rains came" and made competition unpleasant for the Relay and Walking athletes.

Secondary Schoolgirls Championships held in April last year and Primary Schoolgirls Championships held in October are proving a most successful venture with up to 1,000 children competing at each fixture; some of them travelling quite remarkable distances for the day, and apparently enjoying every minute of it. The Commonwealth Danking Corporation continue to sponsor the presentation medallions to all placegetters in events at both Championships.


ADDENDUM
